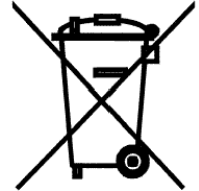

# APPLICATION SOFTWARE USED IN TRADE

1. Must be evaluated and accepted by a responsible metrology authority.  
In the EU, this is the TSO (Technical Services Official).  
In the US and Canada, the metrology inspector responsible for your area.
2. If you have more than one indicator using the same application program, you may have to obtain an NTEP Certificate of Conformance. Check with your local Weights and Measures inspector for more information.
3. The application program cannot be loaded into the indicator or, once in, cannot be modified as long as the calibration inhibit jumper is installed.
4. Provisions are included for verifying the metrological integrity of the displayed and transmitted weights from the application program:
  - A. Displayed Weight
    1. With the application program running, place a weight on the load-receiving platform.
    2. Record the weight value. (Do not remove the weight)
    3. Return to the Menu Screen (turn power off, then on) and select the standard (STD) program.
    4. When the weight is displayed, verify it is the same as that recorded in step No. 2.
  - B. Transmitted Weight
    1. With the application program running, connect a display terminal device (Laptop, PC, Display, etc.) to COM1.
    2. Observe the Gross weight being transmitted by the standard (STD) program from COM1. (Note that COM1 is under the exclusive control of the standard (STD) program when the indicator is configured for "Trade" or legal applications).
    3. Observe the Gross weight transmitted from a port utilized by the application program (any port but COM1). This weight must be identical to that observed in step No. 2.
5. When developing application programs for use in Trade, you should check with the responsible metrology authorities to ensure that your program employs the proper safeguards.

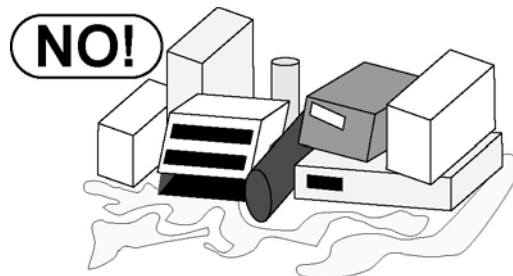
# SITE PREPARATION REQUIREMENTS

The Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator is a precision weight-measuring instrument. As with any precision instrument, it requires an acceptable environment to operate at its peak performance and reliability. This section is provided to assist you in obtaining such an environment.

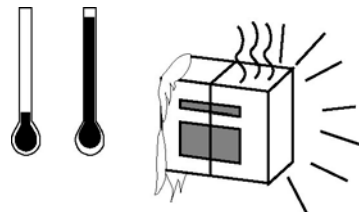
## Environmental

The Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator meets or exceeds all certification requirements within a temperature range of 14 to 104 °F (-10 to +40 °C).

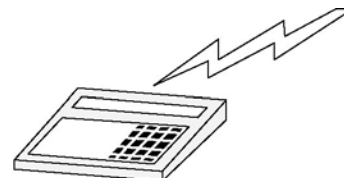
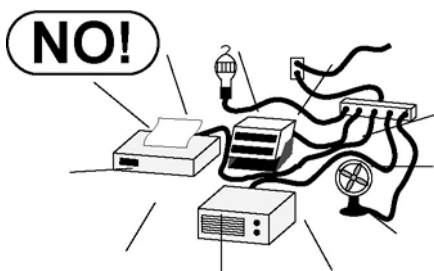
To keep cooling requirements to a minimum, the indicator should be placed out of direct sunlight, and to provide adequate air circulation, keep the area around the indicator clear.



Make certain the indicator is not directly in front of a heating or cooling vent. Such a location will subject the indicator to sudden temperature changes, which may result in unstable weight readings.



Ensure that the indicator has good, clean AC power and is properly grounded. In areas subject to lightning strikes, additional protection to minimize lightning damage, such as surge suppressors, should be installed.



# SITE PREPARATION REQUIREMENTS, CONT.

## Electrical Power

The Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator has been designed to operate from 100 to 240 VAC at 50/60 Hz. Note that a special order is not required for operation at 230/240 VAC.



**CAUTION! - To avoid electrical hazards and possible damage to the indicator, DO NOT, under any circumstances, cut, remove, alter, or in any way bypass the power cord grounding prong.**

- The socket outlet supplying power to the indicator should be on a separate circuit from the distribution panel and dedicated to the exclusive use of the indicator.
- The socket-outlet shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible. Note that the AC power cord on the 825 or the push-button power switch (located on the rear enclosure above the AC power cord) serves as the power disconnect.
- The wiring should conform to national and local electrical codes and ordinances and should be approved by the local inspector to ensure compliance.
- For outdoor operations, the socket-outlet must provide GFCI (ground fault circuit interrupter) protection.
- On installations requiring 230/240 VAC power, **it is the responsibility of the customer** to have a qualified electrician install the proper power cord plug that conforms to national electrical codes and local codes, and ordinances.

## Electrical Noise Interference

To prevent electrical noise interference, make certain all other wall outlets for use with air conditioning and heating equipment, lighting, or other equipment with heavily inductive loads, such as welders, motors, and solenoids, are on circuits separate from the indicator. Many of these disturbances originate within the building itself and can seriously affect the operation of the instrument. These sources of disturbances must be identified, and steps must be taken to prevent possible adverse effects on the instrument. Examples of available alternatives include isolation transformers, power regulators, uninterruptible power supplies, or simple line filters.

## Transient Suppression

The following recommendations will help to reduce transients:

- Always use shielded cables to connect signal wires to the weight indicator.
- Secure the cables in the cable clips provided inside the indicator.
- Connect the cable shield (indicator end only) to a ground point inside the indicator. Keep wires that extend beyond the shield as short as possible.
- Do not run load cell or signal cables from the weight indicator alongside or parallel to wiring carrying AC power. If unavoidable, position the load cell and signal cables a minimum of 24" away from all AC wiring.
- Always use arc suppressors across all AC power relay contacts (see recommendations at [Q/QRL Quencharc®Capacitor RC Snubber Network](#)).
- Use zero-voltage switching relays, optically isolated if possible.

# **SITE PREPARATION REQUIREMENTS, CONT.**

## **RFI Immunity**

The operation of sensitive electronic equipment can be adversely affected by RF (Radio Frequency) radio transmissions. Digital weight indicators are one such type of equipment. Radio transmissions come from things like hand-held radio transmitters and cell phones. One symptom of RFI (Radio Frequency Interference) in a digital weight indicator is weight indication instability during a radio transmission.

Cardinal digital weight indicators are designed with special grounding and RFI shielding to achieve a high degree of immunity to common RFI. To maximize the digital weight indicator's immunity to radio transmissions, follow these guidelines:

1. ALWAYS use shielded cable for all I/O (Input/Output) connections to the digital weight indicator.
2. NEVER operate any radio transmitter within 2 meters (~6ft.) of the weight indicator.
3. NEVER connect un-terminated serial, digital, or analog I/O cables to the internal printed circuit boards of the digital weight indicator.
4. KEEP the intended external I/O device connected to the I/O cables entering the digital weight indicator.
5. ALWAYS connect the shield of the shielded cable to the indicator back panel gland connector or the closest ground terminal inside the indicator.
6. ALWAYS connect the shield of the shielded I/O cable at the indicator end only. Leave the shield unconnected at the I/O device.





# INSTALLATION

Before beginning installation of your Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator, make certain that it has been received in good condition. Carefully remove it from the shipping carton and inspect it for any evidence of damage (such as exterior dents or scratches) that may have taken place during shipment. Keep the carton and packing material for return shipment if it should become necessary. It is the responsibility of the purchaser to file all claims for any damages or loss incurred during transit.

## Placement

The Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator is housed in a mild steel enclosure designed to be placed on a desk, table, or other smooth, flat, horizontal surface. Refer to Figure No. 1.

Position the indicator on a stable, flat, and level surface, ensuring it is shielded from direct sunlight and any swiftly moving air sources such as heating or cooling vents, and fans. Route the power cord and peripheral cables away from regular traffic pathways. Optimal placement of the indicator should prioritize easy visibility of the display while also providing convenient access to the keypad for operators.

## INSTALLATION, CONT.

### Indicator Power Switch and Gland Connector Layout

#### PUSH-BUTTON POWER SWITCH

The push-button power switch located on the rear enclosure above the AC power cord is used to power the indicator on and off. If the indicator is off, pressing this switch will turn the indicator ON. If the indicator is already on, pressing this switch will turn it OFF.

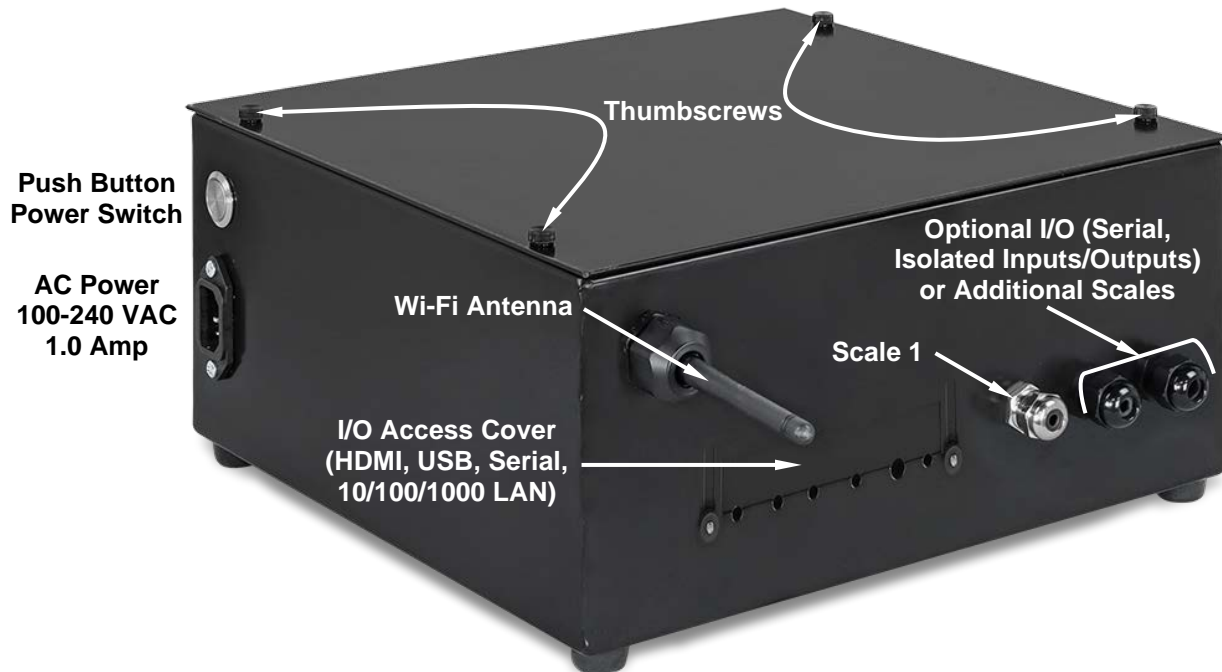

### 825 Internal I/O Ports

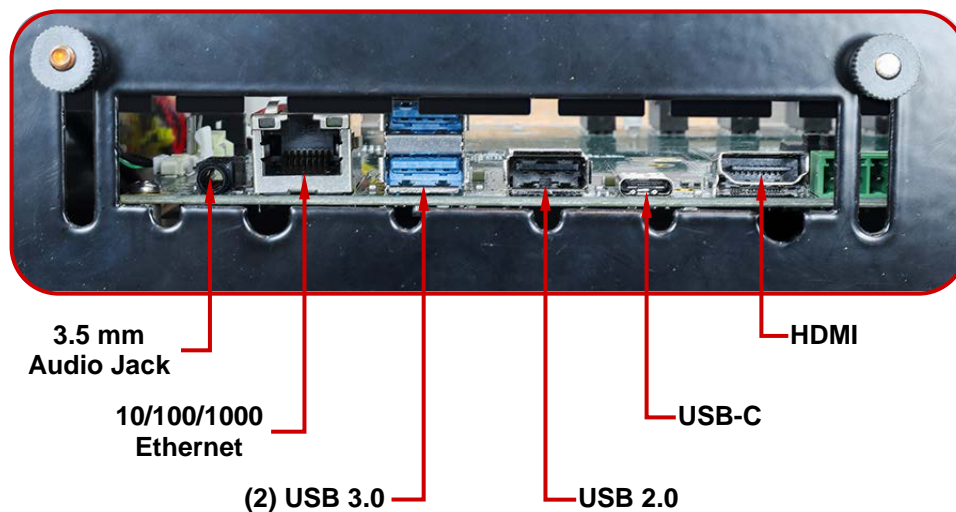

## INSTALLATION, CONT.

### Installing an HDMI Display Cable and USB Keyboard

1. Position the indicator such that you are facing the rear of the enclosure.  
Referring to Figure No. 4, loosen the two thumb screws securing the access panel on the rear of the enclosure and then slide the thumb screws and panel up to expose the ports on the mainboard. Slightly tighten the thumb screws to hold the panel in the upward position.

2. Referring to Figure No. 5, locate the HDMI port on the mainboard (*it will be on the right of the opening in the rear of the enclosure*) and insert the HDMI cable through the opening into the enclosure, and then push the cable connector into the port on the mainboard. Ensure the cable connector is completely in the port, and then position the cable in the notch on the rear of the enclosure. See Figure No. 6.
3. Next, again, referring to Figure No. 5, locate the two USB ports next to the network cable port (*they will be approximately in the center of the opening*) and insert the USB keyboard cable into either one of the ports on the mainboard. Ensure the keyboard cable connector is completely in the port, and then position the keyboard cable in the middle notch on the rear of the enclosure. See Figure No. 6.

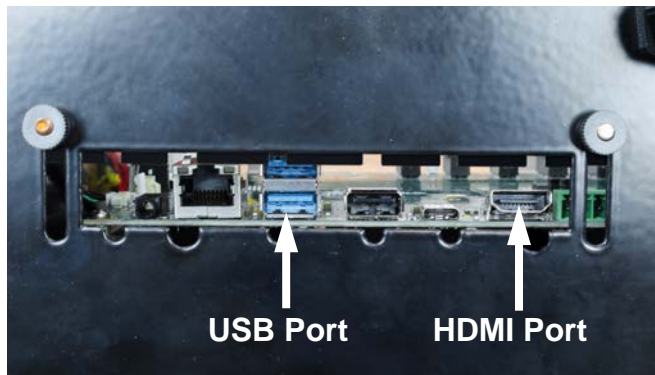

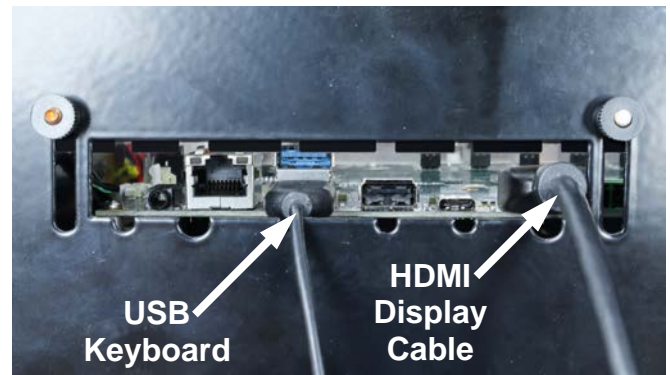

## INSTALLATION, CONT.

### Installing an HDMI Display Cable and USB Keyboard

4. Loosen the two thumb screws holding the access panel in the upward position and then lower it down over the HDMI and USB keyboard cables. Ensure both cables are in their appropriate notches in the panel, and then tighten the thumb screws securing the panel and cables in place. See Figure No. 7.

## INSTALLATION, CONT.

### Load Cell Cable Connection with RFI Suppression



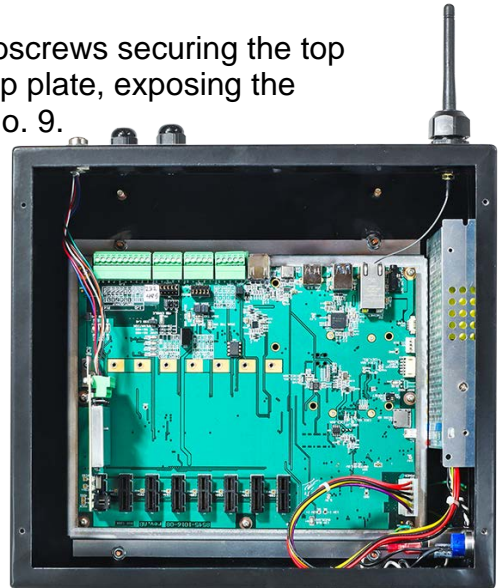
**WARNING! Disconnect any external load cell power supply before connecting load cells to the indicator. Failure to do so will result in permanent damage to the indicator.**

To eliminate RFI, the load cell cable should be routed through the special metallic gland connector, and the shield wire from the load cell cable must be connected to this gland connector for grounding. Refer to Figure No. 2 for the gland connector layout.

1. Referring to Figure No. 8, remove the four (4) thumbscrews securing the top plate to the base enclosure, and then remove the top plate, exposing the main PC board in the base enclosure. See Figure No. 9.

2. Loosen and remove the metal gland connector nut, and then remove the plastic insert.
3. Referring to Figure No. 10, route the single cable from the load cell or load cell junction box through the nut and plastic insert and into the base enclosure.
4. With the load cell cable routed into the base enclosure, refer to Figure No. 11 and then remove approximately 6 inches of the cable outer insulating jacket, exposing the internal wires.
5. Next, cut the shield wire so that it extends past the outer jacket approximately 3/4 inch.
6. Now, remove 1/4 inch of insulation from the end of each of the six wires (with sense leads) or four wires (without sense leads).

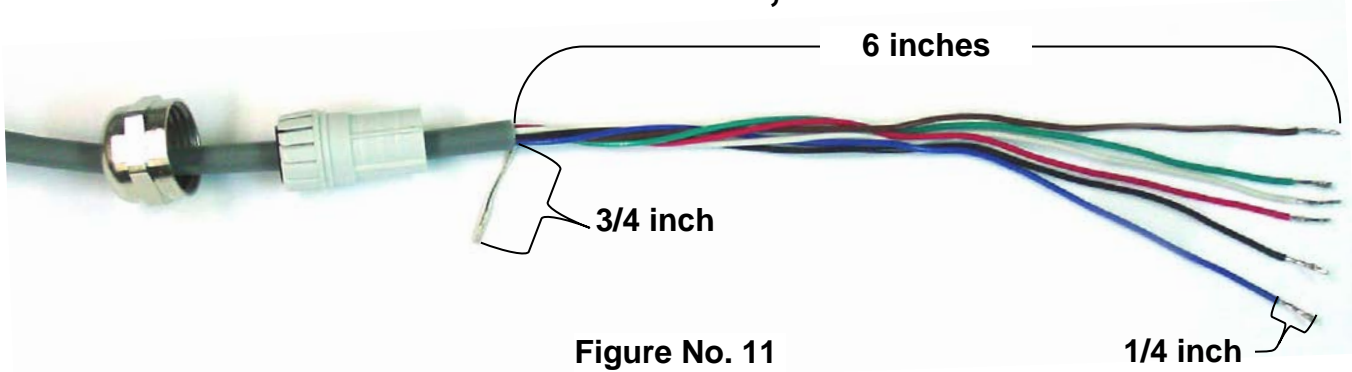

4. Remove the screw securing the 825 Scale Input Board (825-SIB) to the main PC board, and then lift the 825-SIB straight up to remove it from the base enclosure. See Figure No. 12.
5. Remove the 7-conductor terminal from the 825-SIB. (Hold the board in place, grasp the terminal block connector, and lift straight up away from the board). See Figure No. 13.

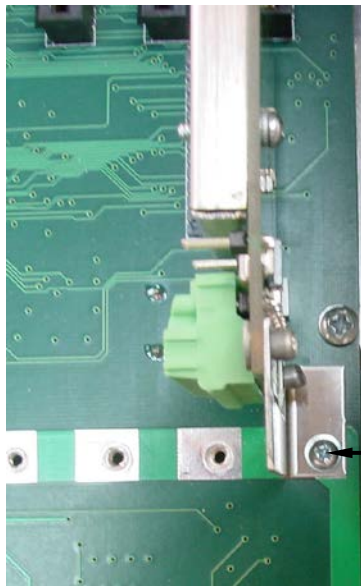

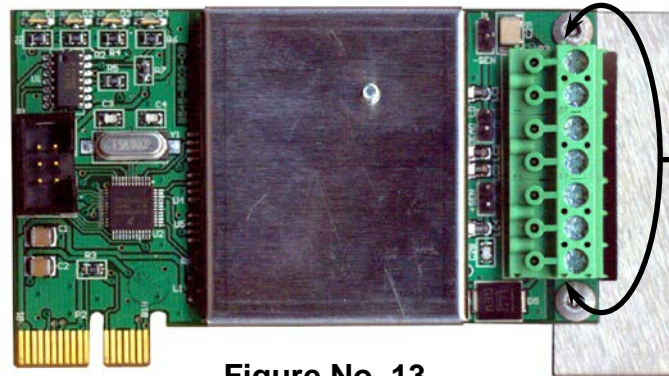

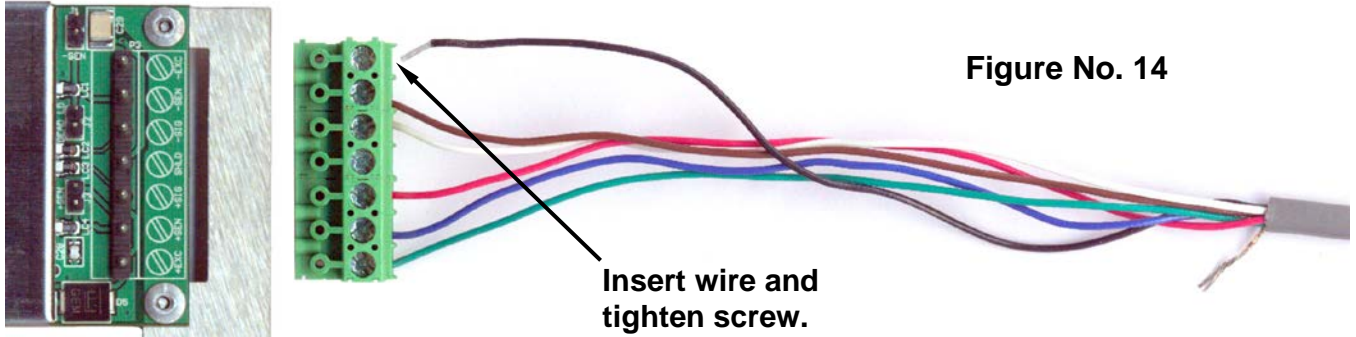
6. Referring to the table below and the labels on the circuit board for terminal connections, connect each wire to the terminal block.

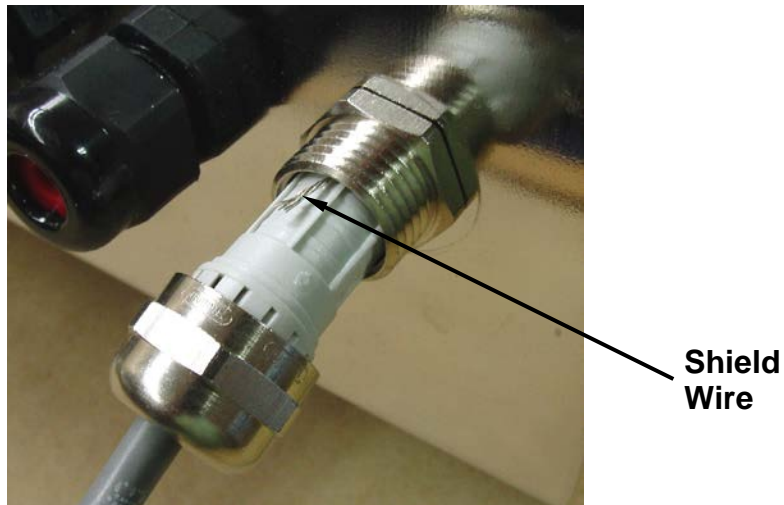
## INSTALLATION, CONT.

7. To terminate a wire, loosen the screws in the terminal block and then insert the wire into the terminal opening. Tighten the screw to secure the wire in place. See Figure No. 14.
8. Repeat the procedure until all wires are in place.



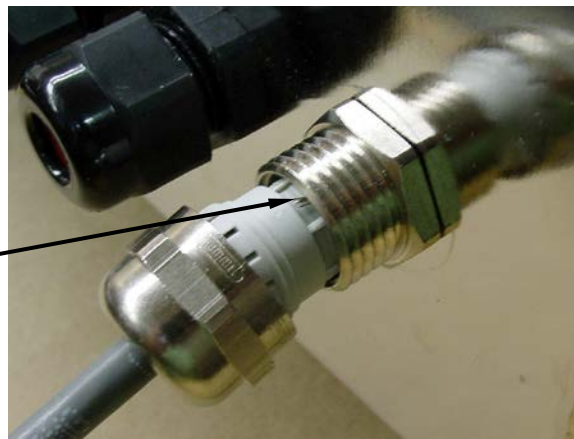
9. After all terminations have been made, remove the excess cable from the base enclosure.
10. Referring to Figure No. 15, fold the shield wire back over the plastic insert and then insert the plastic insert (with the shield wire) into the gland connector.

11. The shield wire is secured when tightening the gland connector nut. Do not overtighten the connector, but make certain it is snug. See Figure No. 16.

## INSTALLATION, CONT.

### Load Cell Cable Connection without RFI Suppression

The following instructions describe the load cell connection without RFI Suppression, should it not be required. Refer to Figure No. 2 for the gland connector layout.

1. Referring to Figure No. 8, remove the four (4) thumbscrews securing the top plate to the base enclosure, and then remove the top plate, exposing the main PC board in the base enclosure. See Figure No. 9.
2. Choose a gland connector for the load cell cable and loosen it.
3. Slip the single cable from the load cell or load cell junction box through the gland connector and into the enclosure.
4. Referring to Figure No. 17, remove 3 inches of the outer insulation jacket of the load cell cable.
5. Next, remove 1/4 inch of insulation from each of the four wires and shield (without sense leads) or six wires and shield (with sense leads).
6. Referring to the table below and the labels on the circuit board for terminal connections, connect each wire to the terminal block.

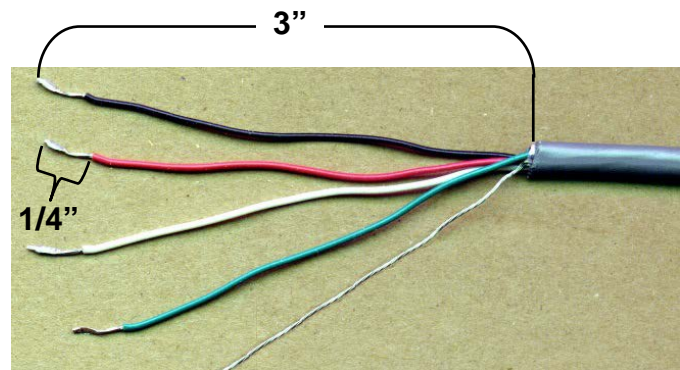

7. To terminate a wire, loosen the screws in the terminal block and then insert the wire into the terminal opening. Tighten the screw to secure the wire in place. See Figure No. 13.
8. Repeat the procedure until all wires are in place.

### Load Cell Connections with Over 30 Feet of Cable

For installations with over 30 feet of cable between the 825 and the load cells, sense wires should be used. The sense wires must be connected between the +SENS, -SENS terminals on the 825-SIB (Scale Input Board) and the +EXCITATION, -EXCITATION wires of the load cells or the +SENS, -SENS terminals of the load cell trim board (or the section seal trim board). For the 825-SIB to use the sense wires, the -SENS and +SENS jumpers J1 and J3 must be open (on one pin only) or removed. Refer to Figure No. 26 for the location of these jumpers.

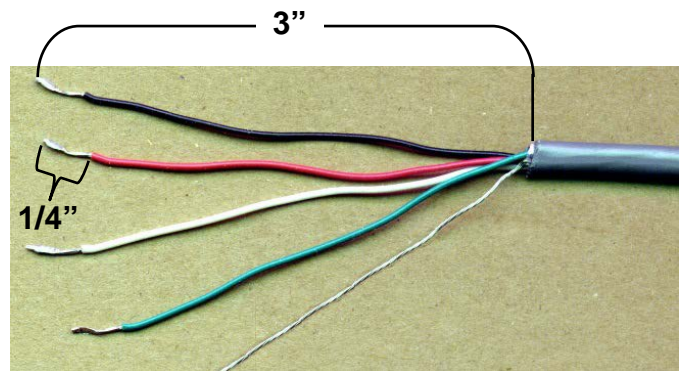


## INSTALLATION, CONT.

### Serial and I/O Cable Installation

The 825 indicator may be connected to a printer to record weight and associated data, or it may be connected to a remote display or even to a computer for transmission of weight data. The weight data may be transmitted on demand (by pressing the **PRINT** key or on receipt of a command from the computer).

1. Referring to Figure No. 8, remove the four (4) thumbscrews securing the top plate to the base enclosure, and then remove the top plate, exposing the main PC board in the base enclosure. See Figure No. 9.
2. Choose a gland connector for the I/O cable and loosen it.
3. Slip the cable through the gland connector and into the enclosure.
4. Referring to Figure No. 18, remove 3 inches of the outer insulation jacket of the cable.
5. Next, remove 1/4 inch of insulation from each of the wires.
6. Referring to the corresponding I/O tables and figures in the next sections, connect each wire to the terminal block.
7. To terminate a wire, loosen the screws in the terminal block and then insert the wire into the terminal opening. Tighten the screw to secure the wire in place.
8. Repeat the procedure until all wires are in place.

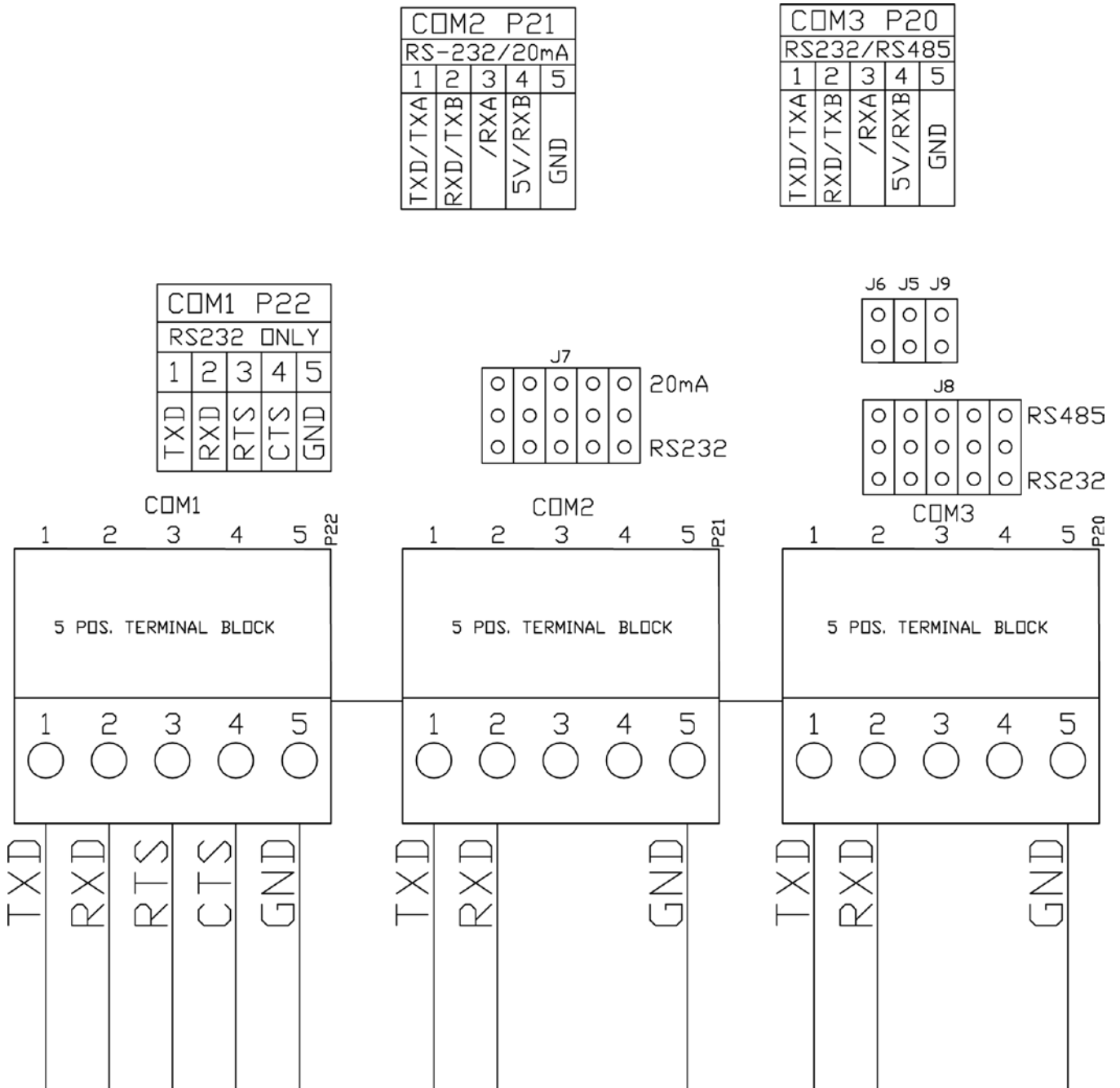

## Jumpers

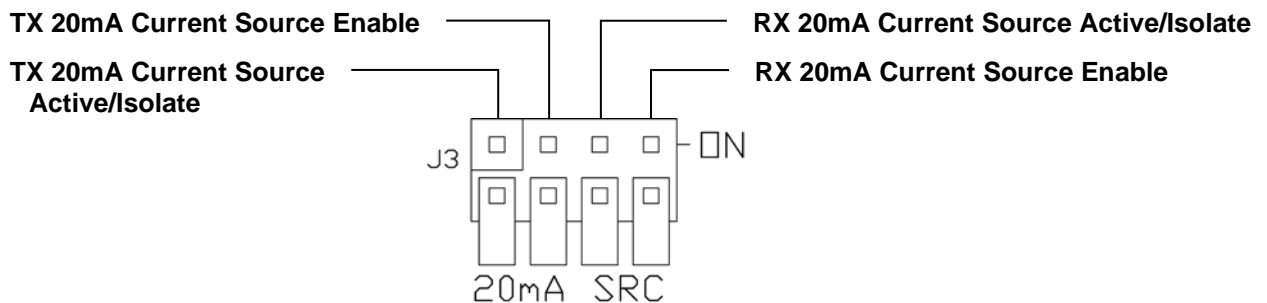
### J1 and J2 - ISO I/O

When installed, these jumpers allow the 825 indicator to supply (source) 12VDC to a solid-state relay or other load (100 mA maximum).

To completely isolate the outputs when using an external power source, remove (or place on one pin only) J1 and J2. The external power source must provide 12 to 24 VDC to P16 pin 1 (12V) and a ground return to P16 pin 10 (GND). The load must still be 100 mA maximum.

### J3 - 20mA SRC

This bank of 4 individual jumpers controls the 20mA TXD and RXD current source and active/isolate status of P21 (COM2) when the J7 shunt has been installed to select the 20mA current loop serial protocol for P21 (COM2).

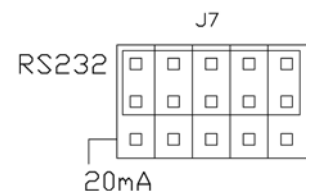


### J5 and J6 - 2 WIRE RS-485 JUMPERS

These jumpers select RS-485 2-wire or 4-wire operation. When installed, the RS-485 operation is 2-wire (half duplex). To enable 4-wire (full duplex) operation, jumpers J5 and J6 must be open (on one pin only or removed).

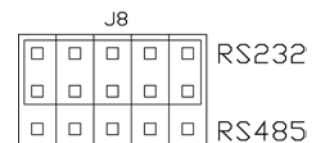
### J7 - RS-232/20mA

This shunt (2x5-pin jumper) controls whether P21 (COM2) uses RS-232 or 20mA current loop serial protocol. When the shunt is installed on the center row of pins and the RS232 row of pins, the RS-232 serial protocol is used. To enable the 20mA current loop serial protocol for P21 (COM2), the shunt must be installed on the center row of pins and the 20mA row of pins.



### J8 - RS-232/RS485

This shunt (2x5-pin jumper) controls whether P20 (COM3) uses RS-232 or RS-485 serial protocol. When the shunt is installed on the center row of pins and the RS232 row of pins, the RS-232 serial protocol is used. To enable the RS-485 serial protocol for P20 (COM3), the shunt must be installed on the center row of pins and the RS485 row of pins.

### J9 - NODE TERMINATION

This jumper is for the RS-485 node termination selection. When installed, the RS-485 node is terminated, indicating the 825 is the last device on the RS-485 bus. If the 825 is not the last device on the RS-485 bus (e.g., it is in the middle of the bus), then it must be un-terminated, and jumper J9 must be open (on one pin only or removed).

### J11 - CAL INHIBIT

This jumper is for the CAL INHIBIT selection. When installed, this jumper inhibits (prevents) calibration of the 825 indicator.

When removed, the word CAL will be shown in the lower right corner of the screen to indicate that calibration is allowed and calibration of the 825 indicator can be performed.

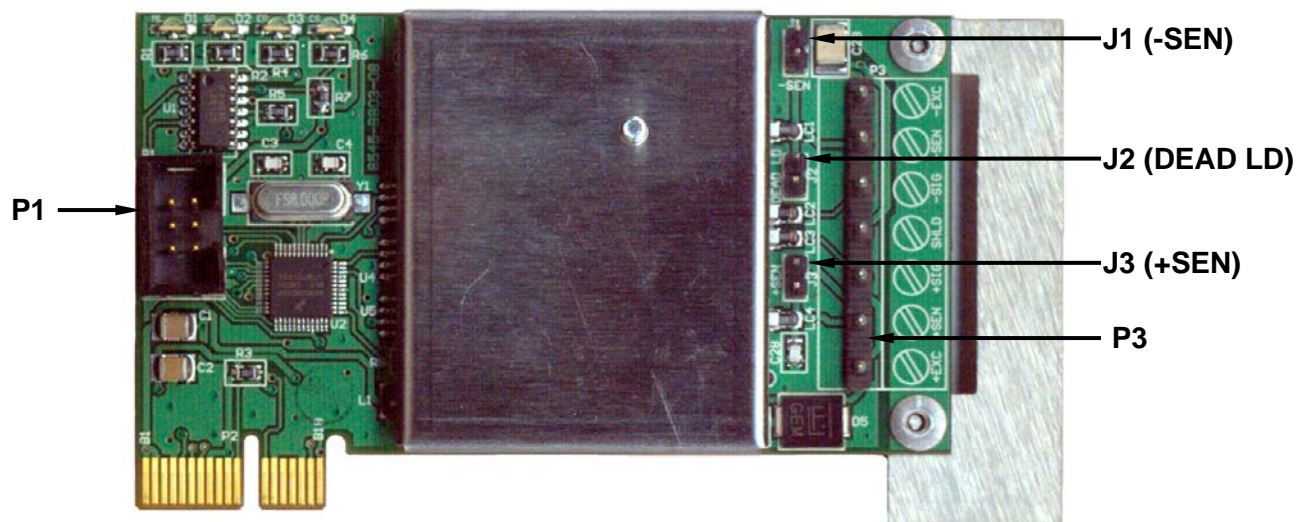

### J1 (-SEN) and J3 (+SEN) - SENSE JUMPERS

If the sense leads are NOT used, you must install the -SEN and +SEN jumpers at J1 and J3 (near the P3 terminal block). These jumpers connect the sense leads to the excitation leads. If sense leads ARE used (as in motor truck scales or installations with over 30 feet between the indicator and load cells), these jumpers should be open (on one pin only) or removed.

### J2 (DEAD LD) - DEAD LOAD BOOST JUMPER

For scales with extremely low dead loads (less than 10% of the combined load cell capacity), connect the DEAD LD (dead load boost) jumper J2 (near the P3 terminal block).

## REINSTALLING THE TOP PLATE

After all terminations have been made.

1. Reinstall the 825-SIB into the enclosure and secure it to the main PC board with the screw removed earlier. See Figure No. 28.
2. Remove the excess cable from the base enclosure and securely tighten each of the cable gland connectors.
  - Do not overtighten these connectors, but make certain they are snug.
  - **DO NOT USE TOOLS!** Finger-tighten only!
3. Ensure any unused gland connectors are plugged.
4. Next, place the top plate on the base enclosure and secure the top plate to the base enclosure with the four (4) thumbscrews removed earlier. See Figure No. 29.

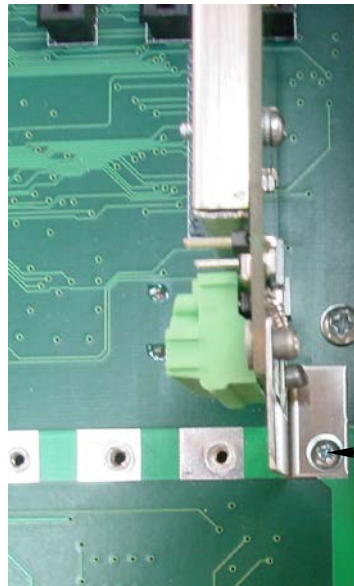

# TOUCHSCREEN OR SCREEN/KEYBOARD FUNCTIONS

The Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator requires an end user-supplied external multidirectional interactive touchscreen or an HDMI or USB monitor and keyboard to operate.

With an interactive touchscreen display connected, a full QWERTY alphabet keyboard, a numeric keypad, and navigation keys with an **ENTER** key will be displayed on the touchscreen to be used to enter commands and data into the indicator during normal operations, as well as during Calibration and Setup. Refer to the example **Start-Up** screen, Figure No. 30, and the example **QWERTY** screen, Figure No. 31, or the connected touchscreen or HDMI/USB display screen while reading this section.

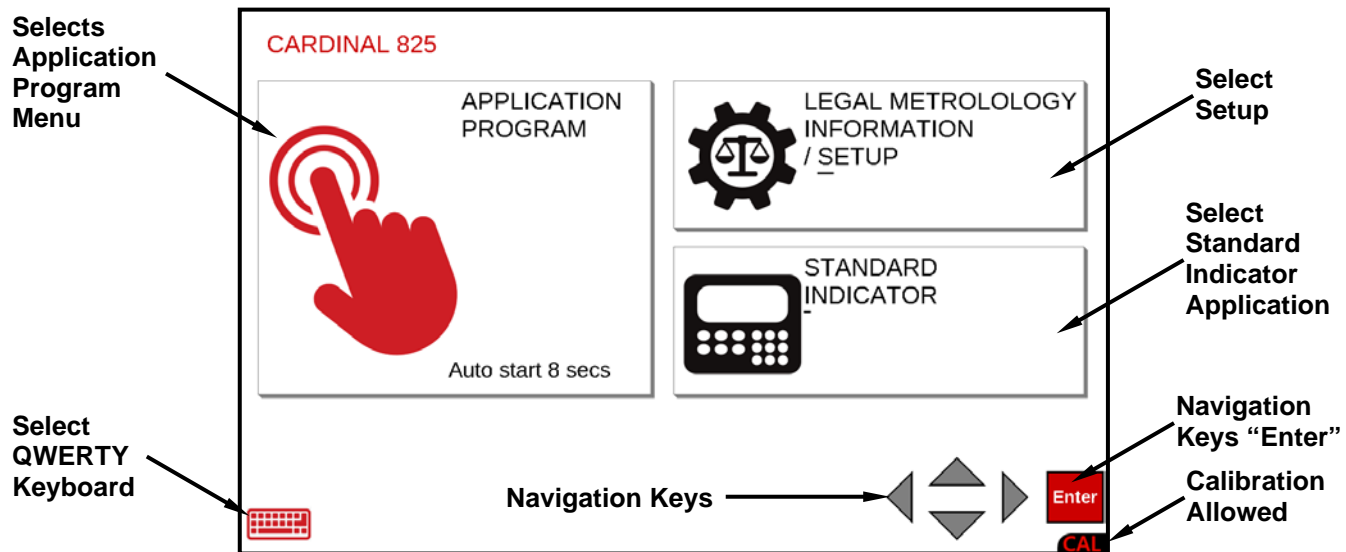

Selecting the QWERTY Keyboard will change the touchscreen to show the alphabet keyboard, the numeric keys, and a different view of the Navigation with **ENTER** keys. Note that the APPLICATION PROGRAM, LEGAL METROLOGY INFORMATION/SETUP, and STANDARD INDICATOR selections are the same as the **Start-Up** screen.

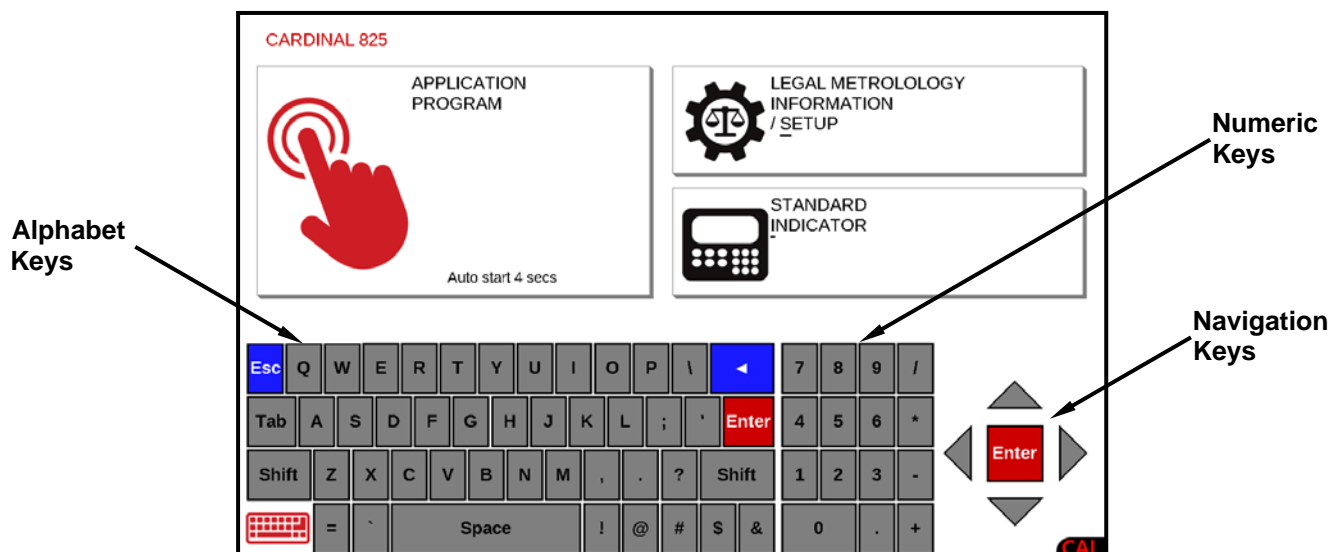

# TOUCHSCREEN FUNCTIONS, CONT.

## Navigation Keys

The Navigation Keys are used to move around and highlight the soft keys and menu selections configured by the STANDARD INDICATOR and APPLICATION PROGRAM selections. During setup and calibration, they are used to select (highlight) the parameter to change and to advance to the next parameter, back up to the previous parameter, or exit to the previous screen. Refer to Figures No. 30 and 31 or the actual indicator while reading this section.



Press the Down Arrow key to move “down” to highlight the selection.



Press the UP Arrow key to move “up” to highlight the selection.



Press the Left Arrow key to move “left” to highlight the selection.



Press the Right Arrow key to move “right” to highlight the selection.

## ENTER

The Navigation Keys **ENTER** key is used to select and perform the function of a highlighted soft key or menu selection.

Note that this key and the alphabet **ENTER** key perform the same functions. Either key can be used when entering or changing data to signal the completion of data entry and process the data entered. During normal operations (as well as Calibration and Setup), pressing the key will retain the current settings displayed and advance to the next setup parameter or setup screen.

## QWERTY Keyboard

This section describes the qwerty keyboard along with any special functions it has. The alphabet and numeric keys are used to enter commands and data into the indicator during normal operations as well as during Calibration and Setup.

### Alphabet Keys

These keys are used to enter alphabetical characters during Calibration and Setup, as well as during normal operations.

### Numeric Keys (1 to 9 and 0)

These keys are used to enter numeric data during the setup and calibration, as well as during the normal operation of the indicator. Note that they have alternate meanings. See the **SHIFT** key.

# TOUCHSCREEN FUNCTIONS, CONT.


## QWERTY Keyboard, Cont.

### SHIFT

Pressing this key before pressing an alphabet or numeric key will cause the key to output its alternate meaning.

When combined with the alphabet keys, the **SHIFT** key causes a lowercase (not a capital letter) to be output. For example, pressing the **SHIFT** key then the **A** key will output a lowercase "a" (not a capital letter).

### (BACKSPACE)

When entering data (either during setup and calibration or during normal operation), pressing this key will delete (backspace) the last character entered. If more than the last character is incorrect, press the  (**BACKSPACE**) key for each character to be deleted. Note that the indicator will ignore pressing this key if no characters have been entered.

### Esc

Pressing this key will "escape" (return or backup) to the previous screen.

### ENTER

The **ENTER** key is used when entering or changing data to signal the completion of data entry and process the data entered. During normal operations (as well as Calibration and Setup), pressing the key will retain the current settings for the parameters displayed and advance to the next screen.

Note that this key and the Navigation Keys **ENTER** key perform the same functions. Either key can be used to select and perform the function of a highlighted soft key or menu selection.

### SPACE

This key is used to enter a blank space during alphanumeric data input for setup and calibration, as well as during normal operations. In addition, some parameters in setup and calibration require pressing the **SPACE** key to toggle their status or to step through the available selections.

## Standard Indicator Keys

This section describes the Standard Indicator keys displayed on the weight screen, along with their functions as programmed by the STANDARD INDICATOR selection on the **Start-Up** screen. Refer to Figure No. 32 or the actual indicator screen while reading this section.

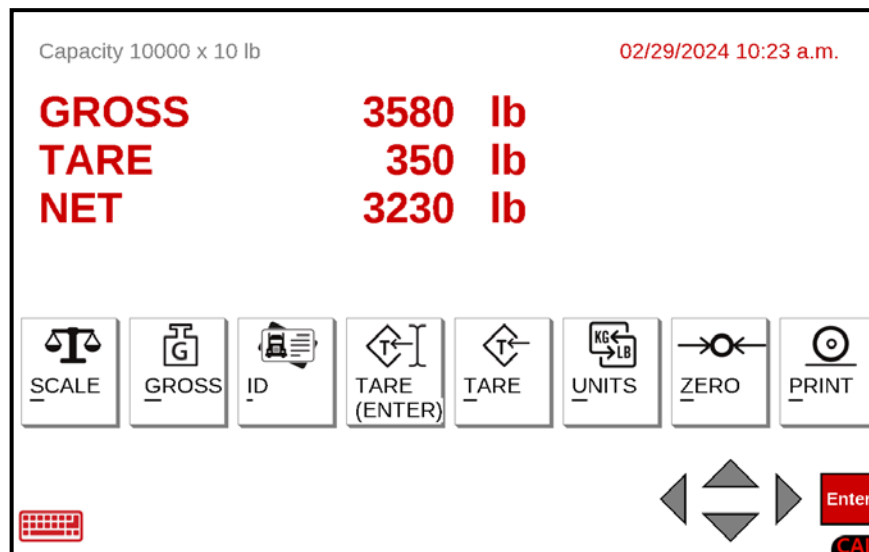

### SCALE

Pressing the **SCALE** key (with multiple scales) will toggle through the available scales and, if enabled, the totalizer. Note that by pressing this key with only one scale, the key press will be ignored.

### NET/GROSS

Pressing the **NET** key (if in Gross mode) or the **GROSS** key (if in Net mode) will toggle between the Gross weight and Net weight. In the Gross weight mode, the total of all weights placed on the scale since the display was zeroed is displayed. In the Net weight mode, the Gross, Tare, and Net weights are displayed.

**NOTE:** If a valid tare weight has not been entered, pressing this key will momentarily display the message:

**Cannot show net - tare zero**

The display will return to the weight screen, showing gross weight only.

## Standard Indicator Keys, Cont.

### ID

This key allows the operator to enter an ID (identification) for use in printing.

1. Press the **ID** key.
2. The display will change to show the **Set ID** screen.
3. Using the alpha and numeric keys, enter up to a ten (10) character ID and press the **ENTER** key to save it.
4. The display will return to the weight screen.

**NOTE:** Once an ID has been entered, it will remain until another ID is entered or it is cleared.

1. To clear an ID, first press the **ID** key.
2. With the **Set ID** screen displayed, press the **SPACE** key and then the **ENTER** key.
3. The display will return to the weight screen.

### TARE (ENTER)

This key allows the operator to enter a tare weight (up to the capacity of the scale). Note that the tare weight is the amount of weight to be subtracted from the gross weight to obtain the net weight.

1. Press the **TARE (ENTER)** key.
2. The display will change to show the **Set Tare** screen.
3. Using the numeric keys (use the period for the decimal point), enter the tare weight, and press the **ENTER** key.
4. The display will return to the weight screen, showing the Gross, Tare, and Net weights.

**NOTE:** The tare weight will remain until another tare weight is entered or it is cleared. Clearing the tare weight can only be performed when zero weight is on the scale.

1. With the zero weight on the scale, press the **TARE** key.
2. The display will return to the weight screen, showing gross weight only.

### TARE (Pushbutton Tare)

Pressing the **TARE** key will act as a pushbutton tare and will store the current Gross weight as the new tare weight and will switch the display to the Net weight mode.

### UNITS

Pressing the **UNITS** key will change the weighing units to the alternate units if available. For example, with lb (pounds) showing, pressing this key will change the weight units to kg (kilograms).

**NOTE:** This feature must be enabled during setup and calibration (see the Base Units and Conv Units parameters).

## Standard Indicator Keys, Cont.

### **ZERO**

Pressing the **ZERO** key allows the operator to reset the Gross weight to zero.

**NOTE:** If the gross weight exceeds the zero limit for this key, pressing this key will momentarily display the message:

#### **CANNOT ZERO -**

The display will return to the weight screen, showing gross weight only.

Note that the zero limit may be either 4% or 100% of the scale capacity. This limit is set during setup and calibration (see the Zero Limit parameter).

### **PRINT**

Pressing the **PRINT** key will initiate the transmission of weight data to the ticket printer. If displaying Gross weight, the time, date, and gross weight are printed. If displaying net weight, the time, date, gross, tare, and net weights are printed.

**NOTE:** If the weight is less than zero (negative weight), pressing this key will momentarily display the message:

#### **Cannot print BELOW ZERO -**

The display will return to the weight screen, showing gross weight only.

**NOTE:** If the weight is unstable (motion on the scale), pressing this key will momentarily display the message:

#### **Cannot print MOTION -**

The display will return to the weight screen, showing gross weight only.

## Application Program Keys

This section describes the various touch screen keys displayed on the screen, along with their functions as programmed by the included APPLICATION PROGRAM selection on the **Start-Up** screen. Refer to Figure No. 33 or the actual indicator screen for the included applications.

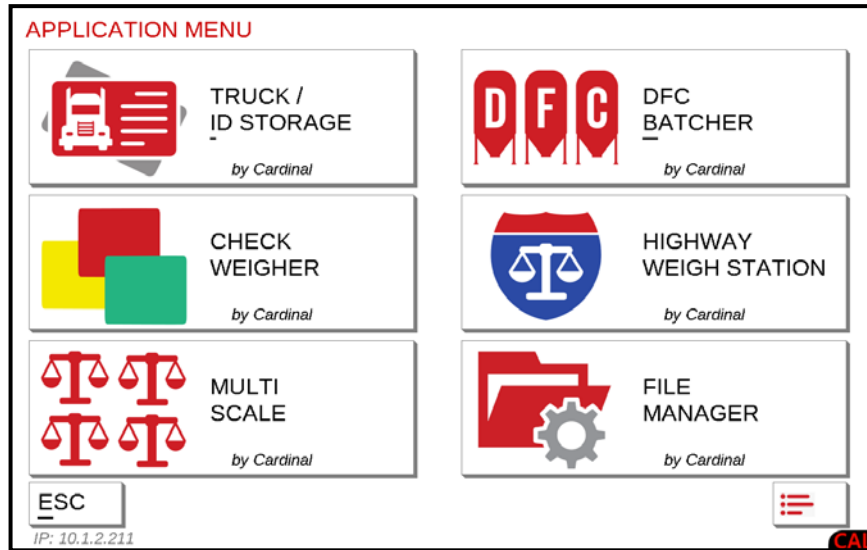

**NOTE:** The following describes the keys that are displayed on the screen and their functions as programmed for the TRUCK / ID STORAGE, CHECK WEIGHER, MULTI SCALE, DFC BATCHER, and HIGHWAY WEIGH STATION applications.

### MENU

Pressing this key will change the screen to display the menu selections for the application. The menu selection allows setting the date and time, configuring parameters for the application, and inputting various data used by the application.

### ZERO

Pressing the **ZERO** key allows the operator to reset the Gross weight to zero.

**NOTE:** If the gross weight exceeds the zero limit for this key, pressing this key will momentarily display the message:

**CANNOT ZERO -**

The display will return to the weight screen, showing gross weight only.

Note that the zero limit may be either 4% or 100% of the scale capacity. This limit is set during setup and calibration (see the Zero Limit parameter).

The display will return to the weight screen, showing gross weight only.

# ANNUNCIATORS

The annunciators are displayed on the weight screen to show that the 825 is in the mode corresponding to the annunciator label or that the status indicated by the label is active.

## CENTER ZERO

This is shown on the weight screen to indicate that the displayed (zero) weight is within  $\pm 1/4$  division of the center of zero.

## GROSS

This is shown on the weight screen to indicate that the 825 is in the Gross weight mode.

## NET

This is shown on the weight screen when the 825 is in the Net weight mode. Note that the screen will display the Gross, Tare, and Net weights.

## TARE

This is shown on the weight screen to indicate that a Tare weight has been stored. Note that the Gross and Net weights will also be displayed.

## tn

This is displayed on the weight screen to show that the weight units are avoirdupois tons.

## lb

This is displayed on the weight screen to show that the weight unit is pounds.

## t

This is displayed on the weight screen to show that the weight units are tonnes (metric tons).

## kg

This is displayed on the weight screen to show that the weight units are kilograms.

# SETUP

Your 825 indicator has been thoroughly tested and calibrated before being shipped to you. If you received the indicator attached to a scale, calibration is not necessary. If the indicator is being connected to a scale for the first time or recalibration is necessary for other reasons, proceed as indicated.

The Setup and Calibration of the indicator are accomplished entirely by using the touchscreen display. However, it may require changing the position of the calibration jumper depending on the method of sealing required by your local metrology laws.

## Calibration Jumper (J11 - CAL INHIBIT)

The calibration jumper J11 (CAL INHIBIT) is located on the edge of the 825 circuit board and can **only** be accessed by lowering the front panel of the indicator. See Figure No. 22 for the location of the calibration jumper. Refer to the table below and Figure No. 22 for the jumper settings.

When the calibration jumper is removed (off or on one pin), the word CAL will be shown in the lower right corner of the screen to indicate calibration is allowed, and that calibration of the 825 can be performed.

**NOTE:** On an indicator with the jumper in this position, the Category 1 event counter security seal is used as the sealing method.

When the calibration jumper is installed (on both pins), the word CAL will NOT be shown in the lower right corner of the screen, and calibration is NOT permitted.

**NOTE:** With the jumper on (installed), the calibration screens are “read-only,” and when the calibration mode is selected, the indicator will display:

### Calibration locked by hardware jumper inside enclosure

On an indicator with the jumper in this position and a lead-wire seal, you cannot perform the calibration unless you break the lead-wire security seal to access the calibration jumper and remove it to enable the hardware calibration. Refer to the table below:

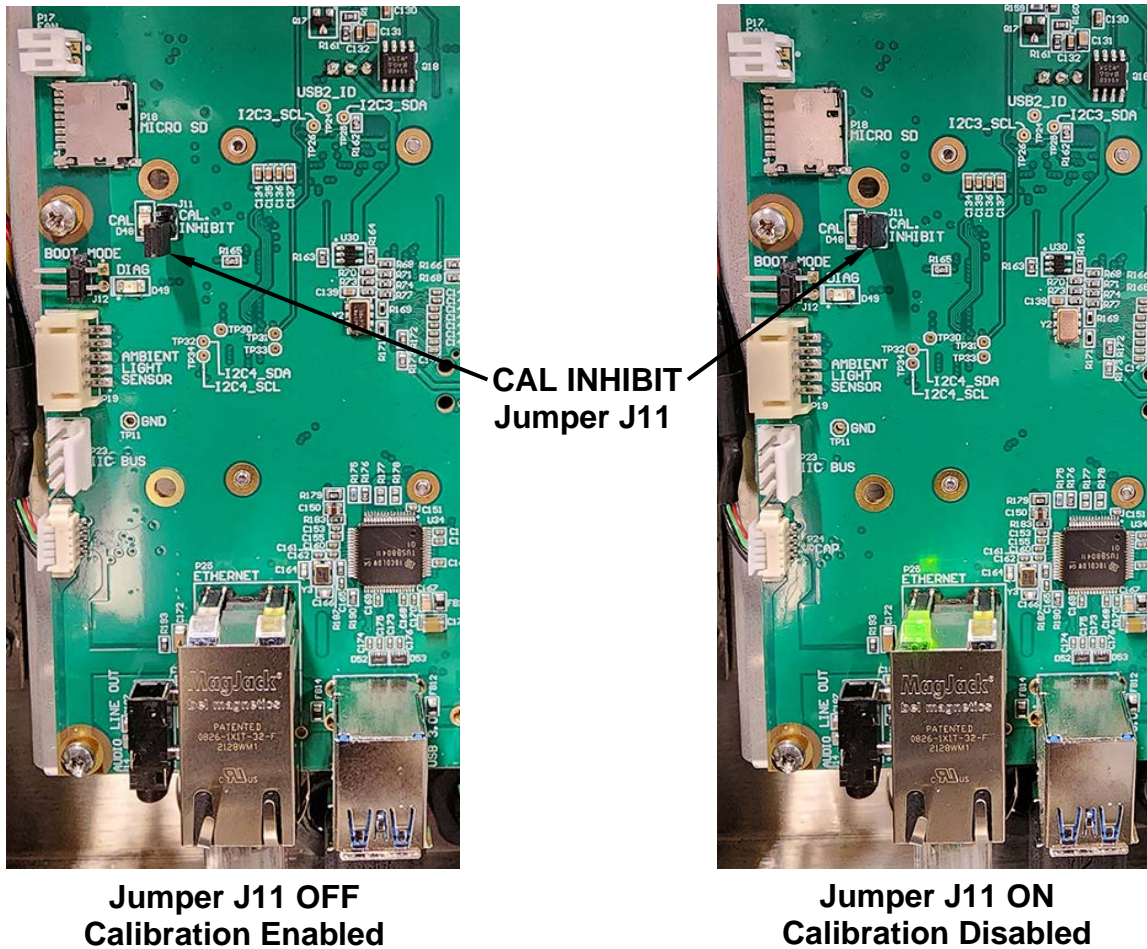

**NOTE:** With the calibration jumper removed (or on one pin), the CAL LED D48 will be illuminated when the 825 is powered on. In the left image above, the 825 was powered off to clearly show that jumper J11 has been removed and is on one pin.

If you attempt calibration with the J11 jumper installed, perform the following steps:

1. Select LEGAL METROLOGY INFORMATION / SETUP on the Start-Up screen,
2. Select the Setup Menu on the Legal metrology information / Setup screen
3. Enter your login on the Login screen,
4. Select Calibration on the Setup Menu screen,
5. Select 1. Scale 1 on the Setup Scale Number screen,

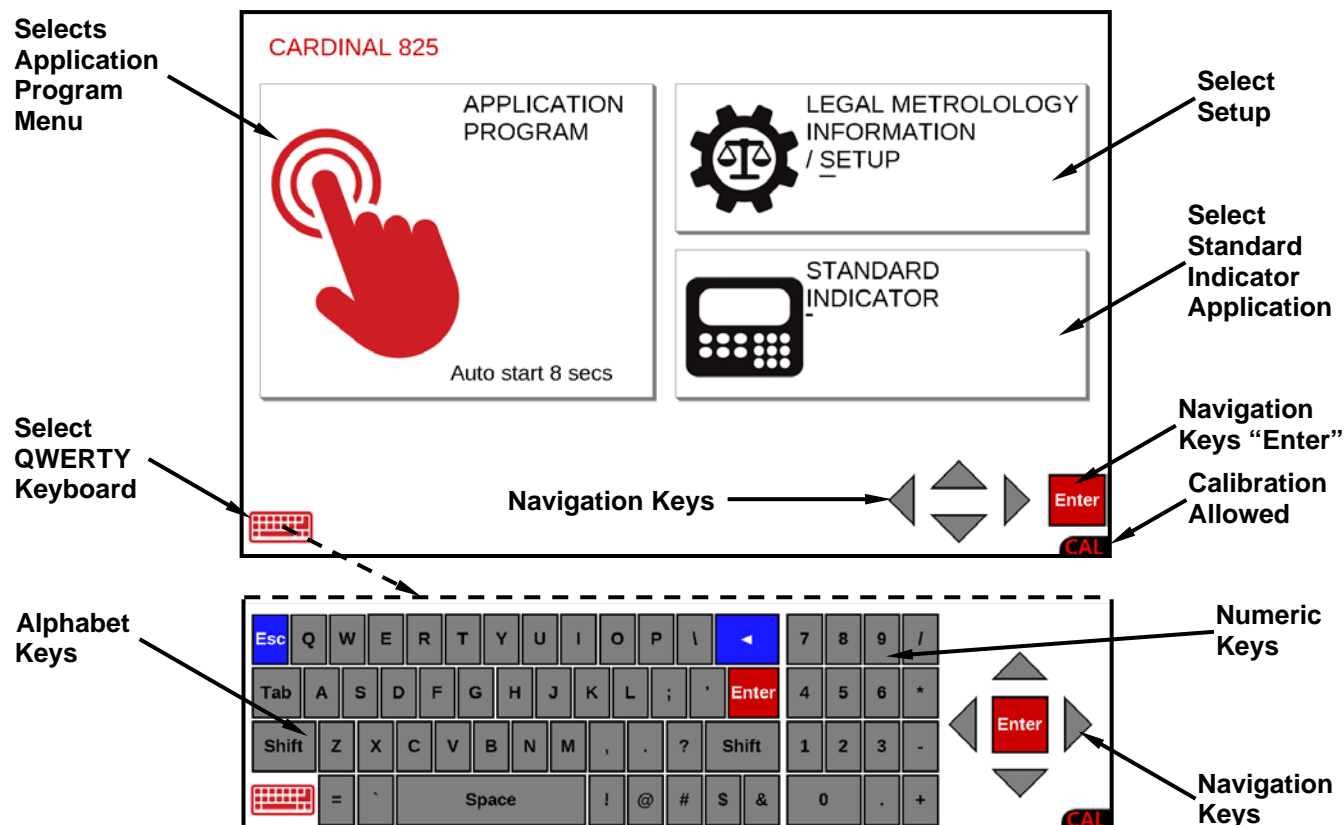

#### Conversion Factor (Conv Factor:)

The Conversion Factor (Conv Factor) is a number that the Base Units (or Conv Units) must be multiplied by to obtain the Custom unit of measurement.

For example, to find the weight of water in a container:

Note that in the example screen shown on the previous page, Gal. (for Gallons) has been entered for the Base Units Custom label.

1. To weigh water, we begin with the fact that at room temperature (70°F or 21°C), water weighs 8.33 pounds per 1 Gallon.
2. To compute the conversion factor, you would divide 1 gallon by 8.33 pounds, with the result being 0.120.
3. Therefore, if the NET weight displayed was 276.5 lb, pressing the **UNITS** key would change the display to show 33.2 Gal. ( $276.5 \times 0.120 = 33.18$ , rounded up to 33.2).

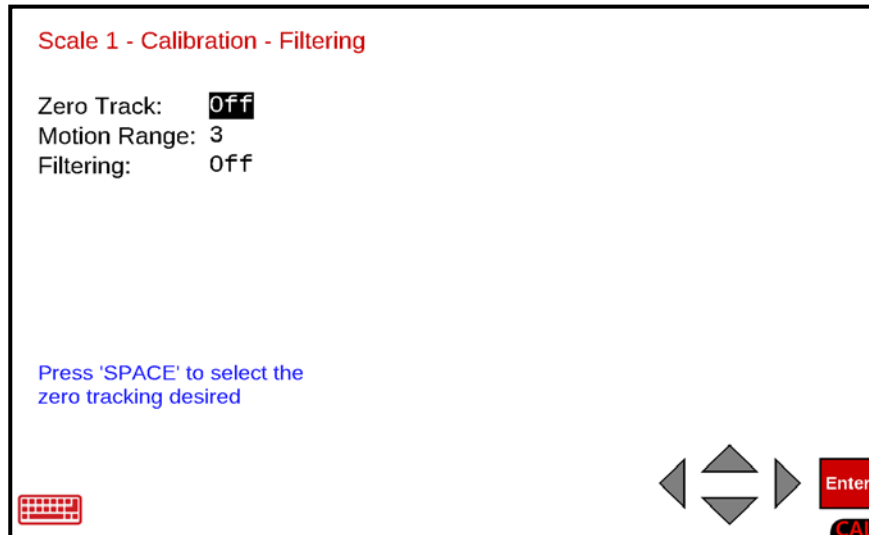

### Critical Sample Rate

With a critical sample rate, as in a filling operation, use (**Filtering: Custom**).

1. **Sample Rate:** (1 to 200 samples/second) determination:

Set the sample rate as close as possible to produce a display graduation change for every graduation of material added to the scale.

$$\frac{\text{Material Flow Rate (lbs/second)}}{\text{Interval}} = \text{Sample Rate:}$$

$$\text{EXAMPLE: } \frac{100\text{lbs/sec}}{10\text{lbs}} = 10\text{s/s} = \text{Sample Rate:}$$

3. **Filter Value:** (1 to 255) determination:

Set to desired results.

3. **Filter Break:** (1 to 64 graduations) determination:

Turn the filtering off by setting **Filtering: Off**. Operate the system as it will be normally used and, by observation, determine the number of graduations of instability that need to be filtered out. Set the **Filter Break:** range to that value.

$$\frac{\text{Weight Change}}{\text{Interval}} = \text{Filter Break:}$$

EXAMPLE: 20,000 x 10lb capacity scale with 800lb variation in the weight display.

- The serial Comm Port 3 communications parameters will default to 9600 baud, 8 data bits, no parity bits, and 1 stop bit.
- The data will be sent out at a rate of 2 times per second.
- Note that the serial Comm Port 3 communication parameters can be changed in the **Communication Menu, Setup Com Port 3** screen.

#### Zero Limit:

With the **Scale 1 - Calibration - Other Options** screen displayed, the current setting for the Zero Limit parameter will be shown. If the setting displayed is acceptable, press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter.

If the current setting is not acceptable, press the **SPACE** key to toggle the setting between Yes and No.

- Select **Yes** to enable the Zero Limit and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter. Note that selecting **Yes** will limit the push button zero and zero tracking to  $\pm 2\%$  of the scale capacity.

With the **Scale 1 - Calibration - Other Options** screen displayed, the current setting for the 2nd Order Lin parameter will be shown. If the setting displayed is acceptable, press the **ENTER** key to proceed to the **Scale 1 - Calibration - Multi Interval** screen, or use the Navigation Keys ◀ Left Arrow to return to the **Scale 1 - Calibration - Other Options** screen.

If the current setting is not acceptable, press the **SPACE** key to toggle the setting between Yes and No.

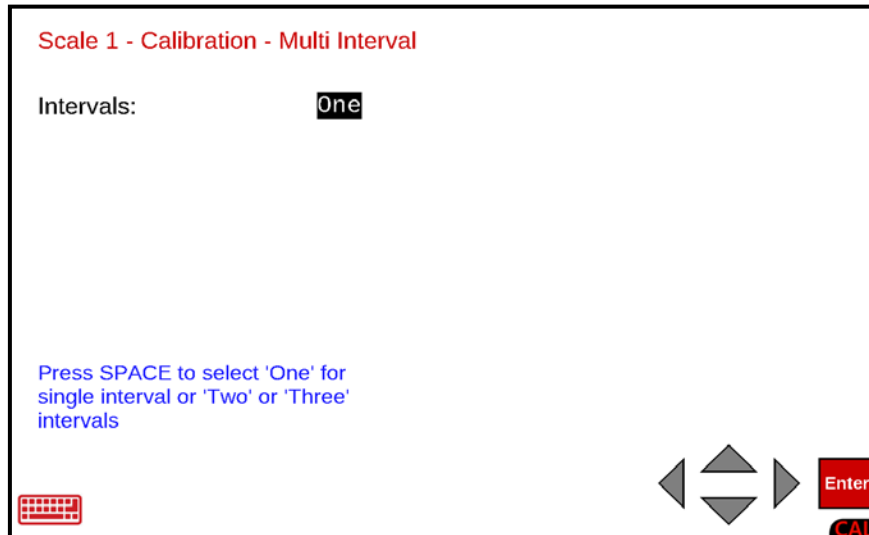

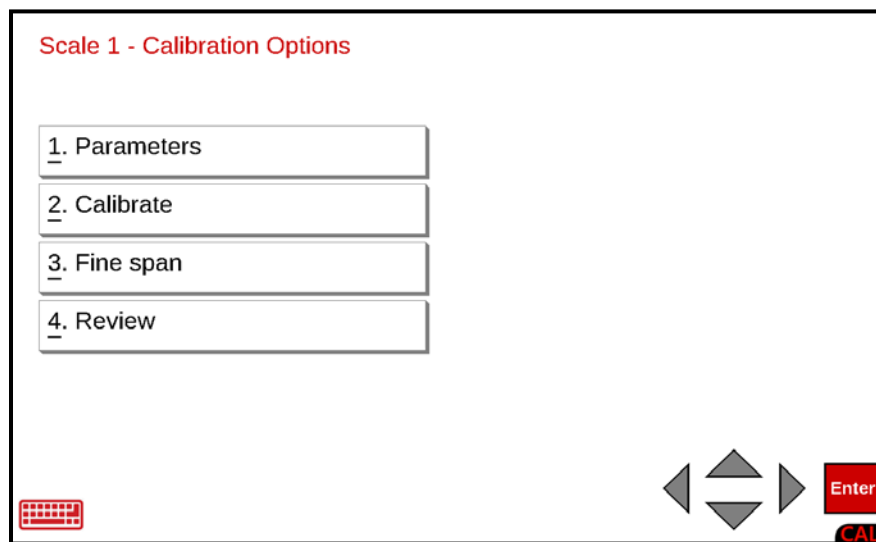
### Calibration Methods

The 825 has two methods to enter the calibration procedure. One method is performed after entering the calibration setup parameters. The other method is selected from the **Setup Menu** screen and skips entering the calibration setup parameters.

Calibration of the scale can be performed using up to four calibration points in addition to the zero (no load) weight. The number of calibration points is determined by the **Num Cal Pts** parameter. When one point is used, only screen prompts for Weight 1 and Weight 2 will be displayed. If more than one point is used, additional screen prompts for Weight 3, Weight 4, and Weight 5 will be displayed.

Note that one weight must be zero (no load) weight.

Fine Span menu option from the **Scale 1 – Calibration Options** screen.

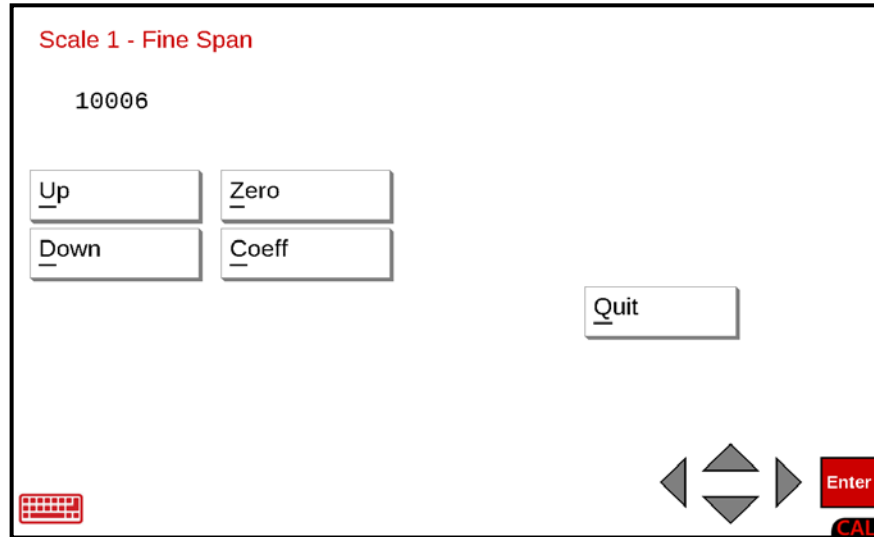

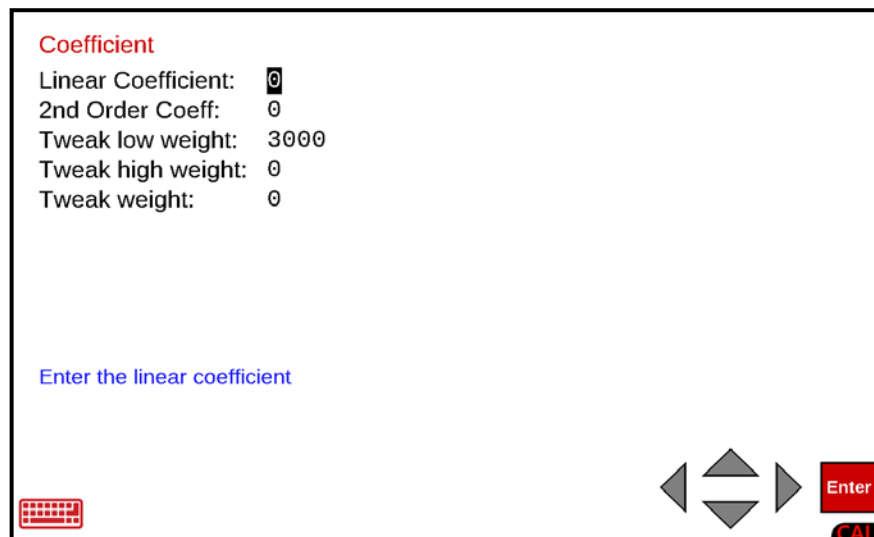

## SETUP, CONT.

### Linear Coefficient:

The Linear Coefficient is applied to the load cell signal to calculate weight.

With the **Coefficient** screen displayed, the current setting for the Linear Coefficient parameter will be shown. If the current setting displayed is acceptable, press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter.

If the current setting is not acceptable, use the numeric keys to enter a new Linear Coefficient and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the 2nd Order Coeff parameter.

### 2nd Order Coeff:

The 2nd Coeff is applied to the square of the load cell signal to calculate the weight.

With the **Coefficient** screen displayed, the current setting for the 2nd Order Coeff parameter will be shown. If the current setting displayed is acceptable, press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter.

If the current setting is not acceptable, use the numeric keys to enter a new 2nd Order Coeff and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the Tweak low weight parameter.



**WARNING! Changing the Linear Coefficient or the 2nd Order Coeff will affect the indicator's ability to display the proper weight. Please consult the factory before making any changes.**

### Tweak low weight

This is the low end of the range of weights that requires adjusting. For example, if after performing linearization testing, the displayed weight is 5 lb low between 10,000 lb and 15,000 lb, the value for the tweak low weight is 10000.

With the **Coefficient** screen displayed, the current setting for the Tweak low weight parameter will be shown. If the current setting displayed is acceptable, press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter.

If the current setting is not acceptable, use the numeric keys to enter the Tweak low weight and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter.

## SETUP, CONT.

### **Tweak high weight:**

This is the high end of the range of weights that requires adjusting. Using the example above, the value for the Tweak high weight is 15000.

With the **Coefficient** screen displayed, the current setting for the Tweak high weight parameter will be shown. If the current setting displayed is acceptable, press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter.

If the current setting is not acceptable, use the numeric keys to enter the Tweak high weight and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the Tweak weight parameter.

### **Tweak weight:**

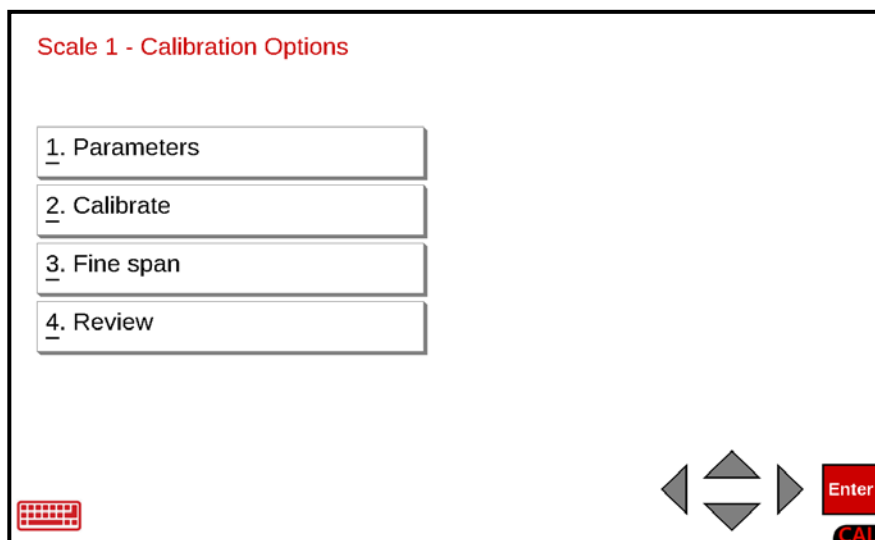
This is the amount of weight that needs to be added (or subtracted) from the range of weight to bring the displayed weight into tolerance. Again, using the example above, the Tweak Weight would be 5.

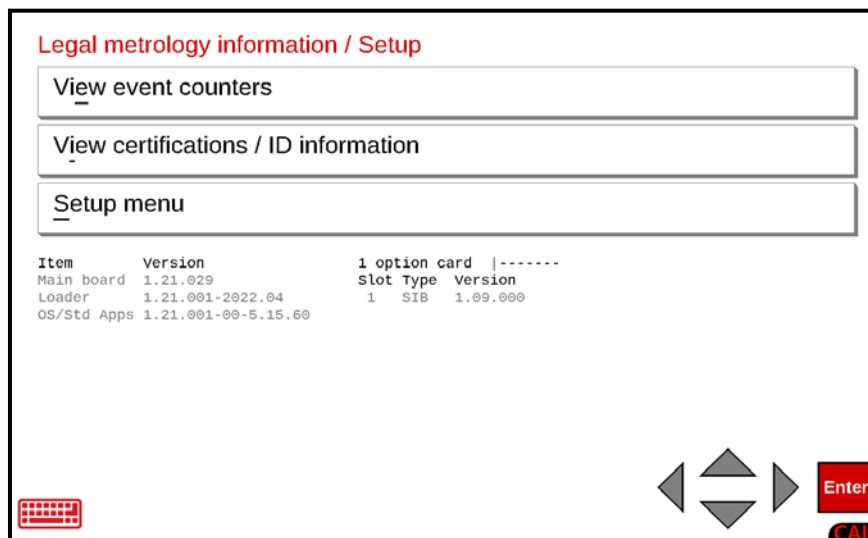
The Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator supports up to eight operators. One operator, the Administrator, has full access to all functions and features of the 825. The remaining seven can be configured to allow or prevent access to various functions and features. Note that only the Login name and Password can be changed for the Administrator operator.

1. Press the Push Button Power Switch on the rear enclosure of the 825 to turn it on. The display will perform a short self-test and then change to the **Start-Up** screen.



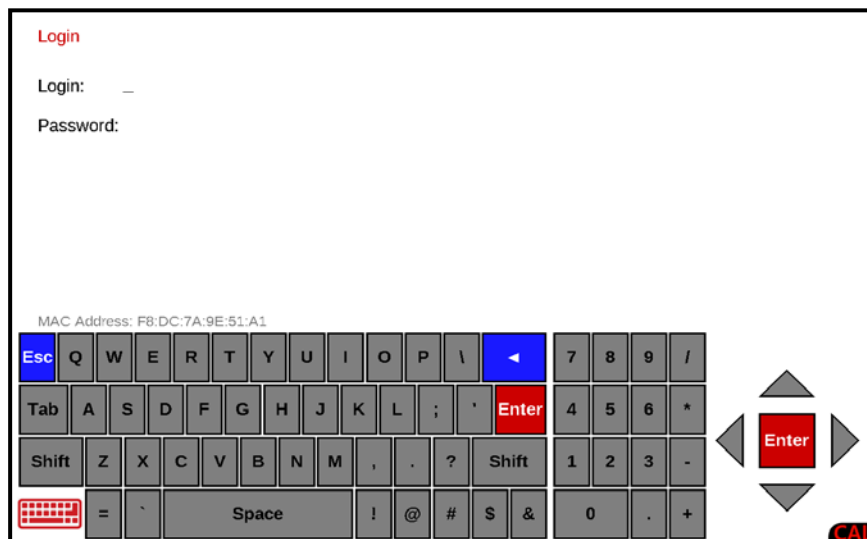
**NOTE:** When the 825 is initially started, an Auto-start countdown beginning at 8 seconds will appear on the APPLICATION PROGRAM selection. When the countdown is complete, the application program mode will automatically start.

2. With the **Start-Up** screen displayed, press the LEGAL METROLOGY INFORMATION / SETUP selection on the touchscreen or use the QWERTY keyboard and press the **S** key to select LEGAL METROLOGY INFORMATION / SETUP or use the Navigation Keys ► Right Arrow to (highlight) the selection and press the **ENTER** key.

With the **Legal metrology information / Setup** screen displayed, press the Navigation Keys ▼ Down Arrow to (highlight) the Setup menu option and press the **ENTER** key or use the QWERTY keyboard and press the **S** key to select the Setup menu option. 

**CUPS**, which stands for **Common Unix Printing System**, is an open-source printing system used on various Linux distributions. It provides a framework for managing and controlling printers in a Linux or Unix environment. Here are some key points about CUPS:

- **Functionality:** CUPS acts as a print spooler, scheduler, and print job manager. It can store information for numerous local or network printers.
- **Widespread Use:** It has become the standard print manager on most popular Linux distros.
- **Web Interface:** Most users interact with CUPS through its web interface, which runs on port 631. You can access it via any browser by navigating to [localhost:631](http://localhost:631). In the web control panel, you can add or delete printers, install drivers, access the print spooler, and configure various settings.
- **Adding Printers:** To add a printer, go to the "Administration" section in the web interface and click "Add printer". If network printers are not automatically discovered, you can manually add them via their network address.

With the **Setup Services** screen displayed, press the **C** key to select **CUPS Printing**, or use the QWERTY keyboard and press the **C** key to select **CUPS Printing**, or use the Navigation Keys to select (highlight) **CUPS Printing** and press the **ENTER** key. If the current setting is not acceptable, press the **YES** or **NO** key to toggle the setting between Yes and No.

- Select **Yes** to use (enable) the Web Access Home (main) page viewing and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter or press the **ENTER** key to return to the **Setup Services** screen.
- Select **No** to not use (disable) Web Access Home (main) page viewing (or if previously enabled, to disable it) and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter or press the **ENTER** key to return to the **Setup Services** screen.

- Select **Yes** to allow (enable) using the Web Access “Edit Configuration File” for the CUPS Scheduler and press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter or press the **ENTER** key to return to the **Setup Services** screen.

With the **Setup CUPS Printing** screen displayed, the current setting for the Log parameter will be shown. If the setting displayed is acceptable, press the ▼ Down Arrow to advance to the next parameter or press the **ENTER** key to return to the **Setup Services** screen.

If the current setting is not acceptable, press the **YES** or **NO** key to toggle the setting between Yes and No.

- Select **Yes** to allow the Web Access to create a “Log Messages” file and press the **ENTER** key to return to the **Setup Services** screen.
- Select **No** to disallow the Web Access from creating a “Log Messages” file and press the **ENTER** key to return to the **Setup Services** screen.

# TROUBLESHOOTING

The 825 is equipped with diagnostic software that tests various portions of the indicator's circuitry and verifies proper operation. Should a problem be detected, an error or status message will be displayed, alerting the operator to that condition. The following lists the operation messages, status messages, and error codes, and their meaning.

## **Operation Messages (Momentarily displayed after the operator attempts an action)**

### **CANNOT ZERO - MOTION**

Attempt to zero scale while in motion.

### **CANNOT ZERO - OUT OF RANGE**

Attempt to zero beyond the allowed range.

### **Cannot set tare**

Tare value invalid.

### **Cannot change weight units**

Scale configured for single weight units: custom, lb, or kg.

### **Cannot show net - no tare**

The "NET" key operation to show gross, tare, and net weights is not permitted when there is no tare weight.

### **Cannot print MOTION**

Attempt to print a ticket while the scale is in motion.

### **Cannot print OVER CAPACITY**

Attempt to print a ticket while the scale is over capacity.

### **Cannot print BELOW ZERO**

Attempt to print a ticket while the scale is below zero.

### **Cannot print WEIGHT ERROR**

Attempt to print ticket during WEIGHT ERROR condition.

### **Operator not allowed to change scale**

The current operator login does not permit changing the current scale selection.

### **Operator not allowed tare**

The current operator login does not permit using the keypad tare selection.

### **Operator not allowed push button tare**

The current operator login does not permit using the push-button tare selection.

### **Operator not allowed to set date/time**

The current operator login does not permit setting the date/time.

### **Operator not allowed to change units**

The current operator login does not permit changing the current unit selection.

### **Operator not allowed to print**

The current operator login does not permit the use of the print function.

## TROUBLESHOOTING, CONT.

### Weight Status Messages (Displayed concurrently with weight)

#### **MOTION**

The scale is in motion based on the motion range parameter.

#### **BELOW ZERO**

The gross scale weight reading is below zero.

#### **CENTER ZERO**

The gross scale weight reading is at the center of zero.

### Weight Status Messages (Displayed in place of weight)

#### **OVER CAPACITY**

The scale weight is over capacity (104% of calibrated capacity).

#### **WEIGHT ERROR**

The weight input signal is out of the acceptable range. This may indicate a disconnected or failing load cell.



**IMPORTANT!** The Totalizer display shows the individual weighing element status in abbreviated form - **MO** = MOTION, **BZ** = BELOW ZERO, **CZ** = CENTER ZERO, **OVERCAP** = OVER CAPACITY. The Total weight display status is displayed as above.

### Error Codes (During Add Operator)

#### **Cannot use same login as existing operator**

An attempt was made to enter a new operator using the same login as an existing operator.

#### **No space for new operator**

An attempt was made to add a new operator when all operator login spaces were filled. The Model 825 supports a total of eight operators. One operator is the Administrator (with full access to all functions and features). The remaining seven are for users and can be configured to allow or prevent access to various functions and features.

### Error Codes (During Edit Operator / Delete Operator / Set Default Operator)

#### **Operator not found**

The operator login entered does not exist.

#### **Cannot delete ADMIN operator**

An attempt was made to delete the administrator login. The administrator login cannot be deleted.

### Error Codes (During View Audit Trail)

#### **Mainboard reports 01 EEPROM corrupt**

The checksum failed. There may be a problem with the EEPROM chip on the main PC board.



## TROUBLESHOOTING, CONT.

### Error Codes (Diagnostic Messages)

#### ERROR - LOST

#### COMMUNICATION

#### WITH MAINBOARD

The operating system did not receive a response from the real-time processor core for mainboard communications. This could indicate a problem with memory corruption, a problem with custom software, or a physical failure.

A full software (*firmware*) reinstallation using a microSD card might resolve the problem.

## BEFORE YOU CALL FOR SERVICE

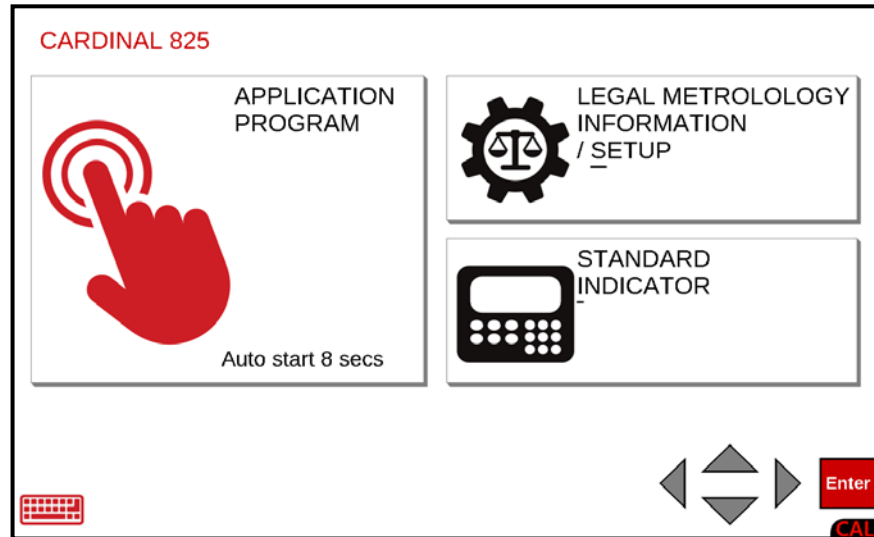
The Model 825 indicator has been designed to provide you with years of trouble-free operation. Despite this, troubles sometimes happen. Before calling for service assistance, you should make some initial checks to verify that a problem does exist. The following describes several types of symptoms along with suggested remedies.

<u>PROBLEM</u>	<u>POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS</u>
The display does not turn on.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Is the AC power cord fully inserted into the wall receptacle?</li><li>• Check the wall receptacle for proper AC power.</li><li>• Try another electrical appliance in the same receptacle. Incorrect weight displayed.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Has the indicator been calibrated?</li><li>• Ensure the scale platform is not touching an adjacent object.</li><li>• Check the load cell connector wiring. If you use four (4) wire load cells, ensure the sense lead jumpers (J1 and J3) on the 825-SIB are installed.</li><li>• Have proper operation procedures been followed?</li></ul>
The indicator will not display the weight.	Refer to the TROUBLESHOOTING Weight Status Messages section and make certain that the <b>OVER CAPACITY</b> message is not displayed. If so, and the scale is not loaded, perform the calibration procedure.

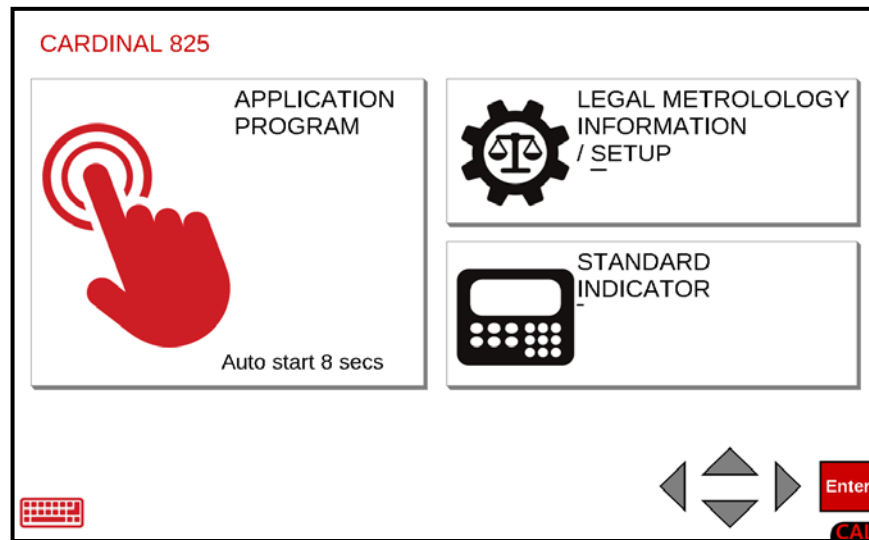


# EVENT COUNTERS

A Category 1 Event Counter is provided on the 825 with two counters that increment when a change is made to features that are required by NTEP or OIML to be sealed. One counter is designated for calibration parameters, and one is designated for configuration changes as required in NCWM Publication 14, 2024. Each event counter has the capacity to record 999 changes. The data for the counters is maintained in non-volatile memory and can be viewed by a weights and measures inspector. When selected, the display will show the number of changes and the date and time of the last update to the Calibrate and Config counters.

If your Model 825 No Screen Weight Indicator is used in a commercial application and your local metrology laws require the use of physical sealing, a lock and wire security seal can be installed on both sides of the top plate to prevent it from being removed from the base enclosure to gain access to the calibration jumper (J11) thereby preventing unauthorized access to the calibration adjustments. Refer to Figure No. 36 below for the details on the installation of the security seals.

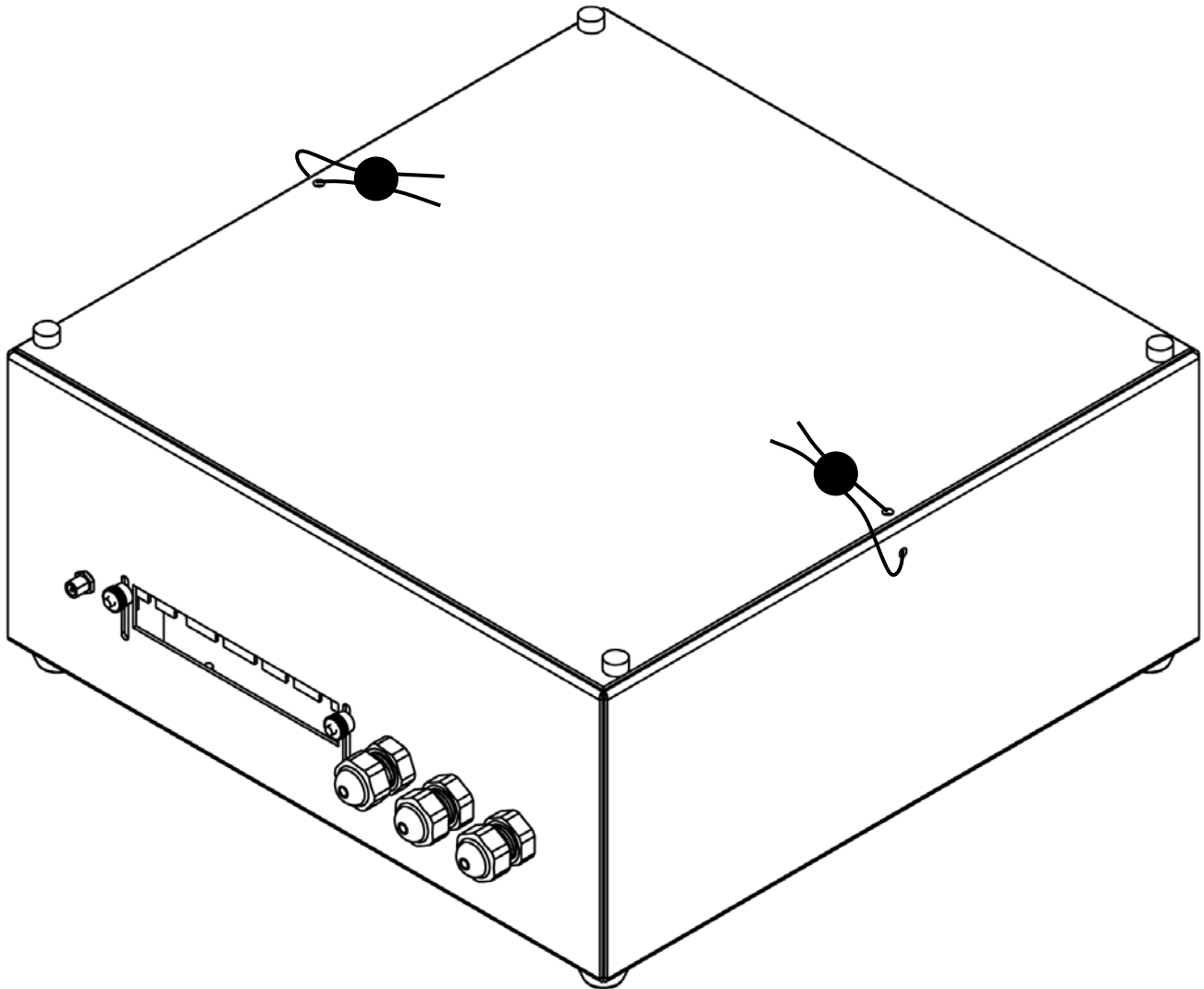

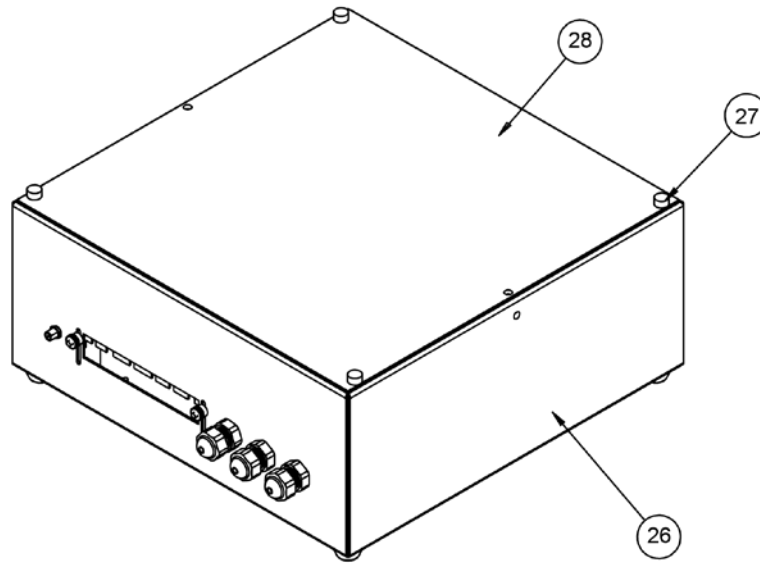

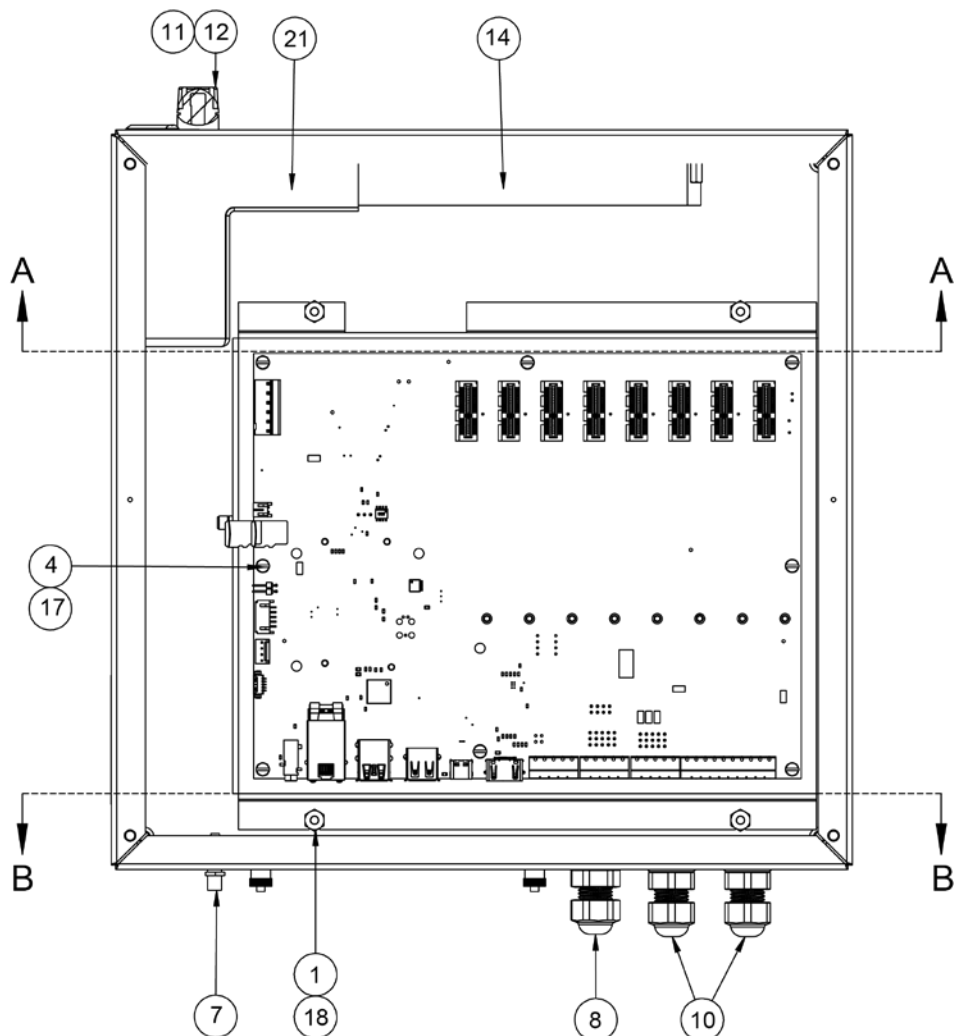

## ISO View

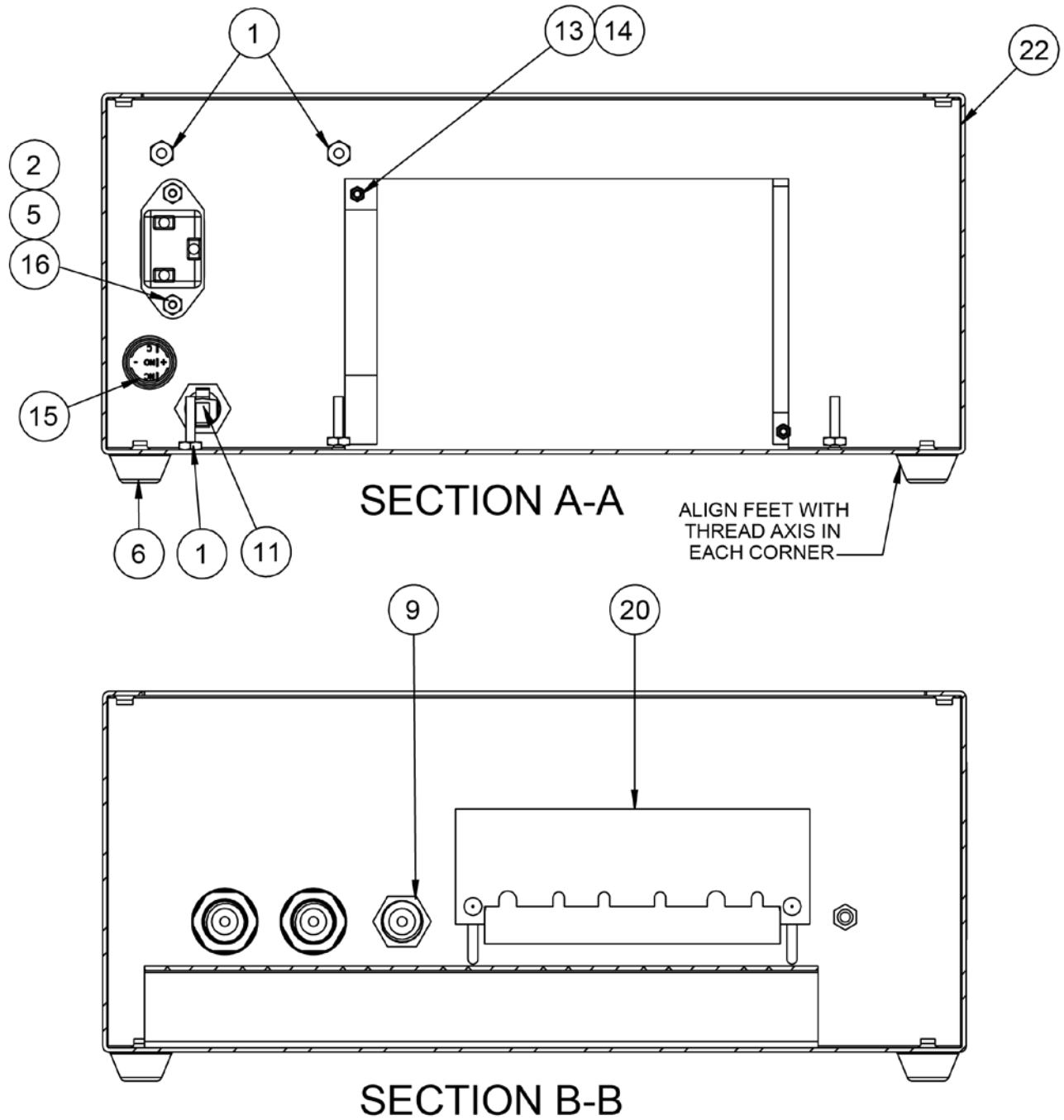


## Overhead View



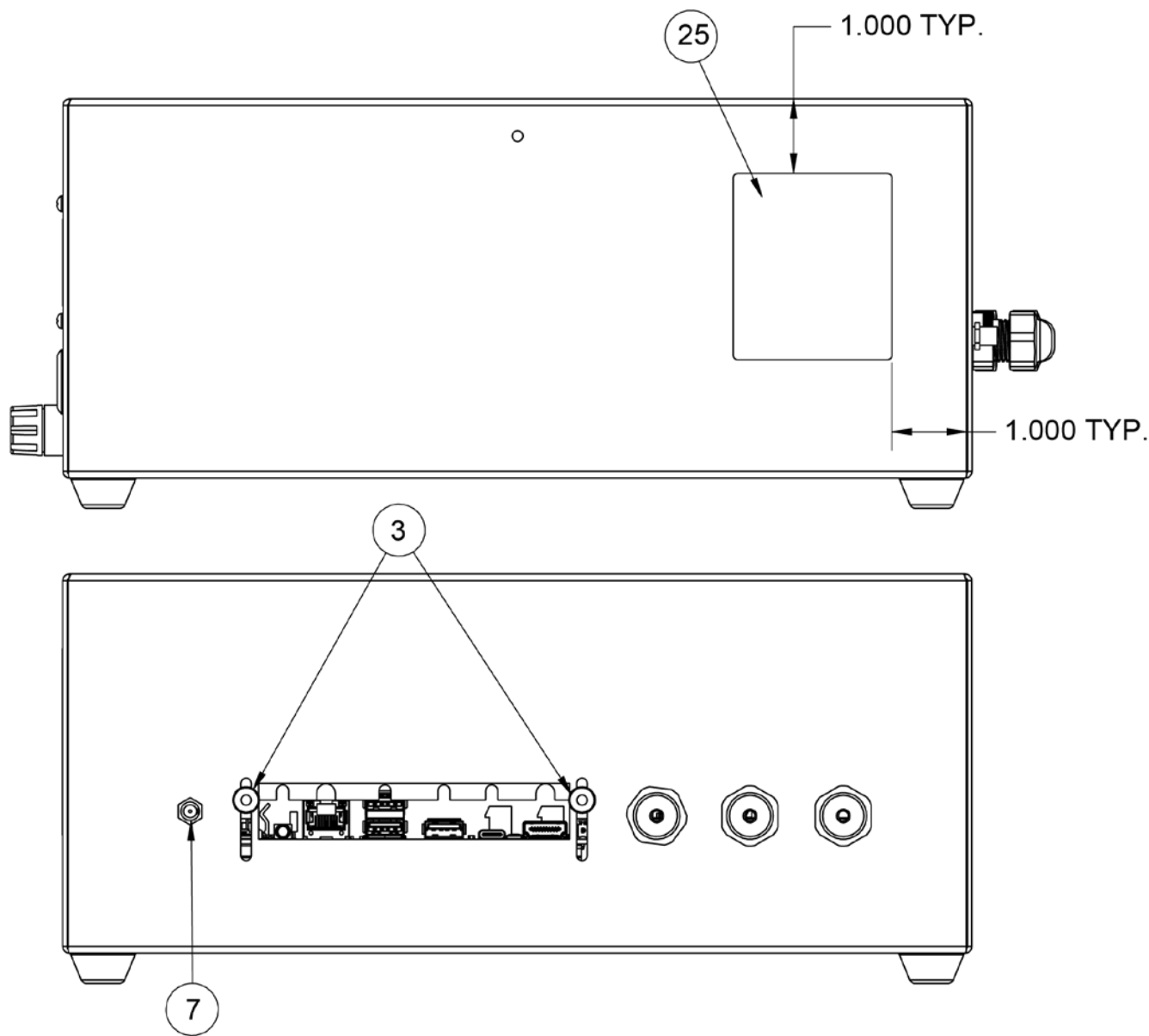

1. This warranty applies only to the original purchaser. The warranty does not apply to equipment that has been tampered with, defaced, damaged, or had repairs or modifications not authorized by Cardinal or has had the serial number altered, defaced or removed.
2. This warranty is not applicable to equipment that has not been grounded in accordance with Cardinal's recommendations.
3. This equipment must be installed and continuously maintained by an authorized Cardinal / Belt-Way dealer.
4. Applies only to components constructed from stainless steel.
5. This warranty does not apply to equipment damaged in transit. Claims for such damage must be made with the responsible freight carrier in accordance with freight carrier regulations.
6. Warranty term begins with date of shipment from Cardinal.
7. Only if device is rated NEMA 4 or better or IP equivalent.
8. Lifetime warranty applies to damages resulting from water, lightning, and voltage transients and applies only to the hydraulic load cell structure itself (does not include pressure transducers, rubber seals, o-rings, and associated wiring).

Cardinal reserves the right to incorporate improvements in material and design without notice and is not obligated to incorporate said improvements in equipment previously manufactured.

This warranty is in lieu of all other warranties expressed or implied including any warranty that extends beyond the description of the product including any warranty of merchantability or fitness for a particular purpose.
